a water system is put at \$70,000 which would include the supply line from Marietta, a 30,000 gallon water storage tank, a distribution system, fire hydrants and other equipment.
These plans of the authority were disclosed Tuesday after the Marietta residents signed two petitions at a town meeting. One petitioned Marietta Borough Council to have the water company appraised, with the intention of the borough purchasing it; and the other asked the Public Utilities Commission, Harrisburg, to deny the proposed extension of water lines to Maytown from Marietta.
The Authority was chartered last month by the State and its members are: John S. Heistand, chairman; Enos Miller, vice-chairman; G. Carl Shenk, treasurer; Paul R. Beshler, secretary; and Mervin S. Arnold.

Lutheran Church Showing Religious Film

"And Now I See", the first Hollywood-produced motion picture of the United Lutheran Church in America, will be shown at Trinity Lutheran Church, Mt. Joy, at 7:00 o'clock on October 5, 1947, it was announced today by the Rev. W. L. Koder, pastor.
The entire congregation has been invited to attend the performance of this dramatic film on Christian stewardship that has been described as "believable", "sincere", and "true to life" by preview audiences in New York, Washington, D.C., Philadelphia, Chicago and Los Angeles. With a cast headed by such well-known movie stars as Ralph Morgan, Addison Richards, Frank Reicher and Nelson Leigh, the film was produced in Hollywood by Cathedral Films, the largest and most successful producer of religious films in the United States.

"And Now I See" is being shown in conjunction with the United Lutheran Church's 30th anniversary celebration and special appeal for its 1,300,000 confirmed members to double their giving in 1948 for the world-wide benevolence work of the Church. Members are being asked to increase their giving from the \$2,153,000 contributed last year, to the new high of \$5,500,000. The appeal was called for by the Church when pastors and lay delegates met in convention at Cleveland last fall.

The action of the motion picture takes place in a typical congregation of the United Lutheran Church. It also features two hymns sung by the St. Olaf Choir and a four-minute statement by Dr. Franklin Clark Fry, president of the United Lutheran Church.
There will also be shown 60 kodachrome film slides with script telling of the development and growth of the Lutheran Ministerium of Pennsylvania. The ministerium, which is the oldest Lutheran Synod in America, will celebrate its 200th anniversary in 1948.

New Floor At Farm Show Building Eases Foot Strain

New walking pleasure for the visitors at future Pennsylvania Farm Shows was assured today by Farm Show Commission members following inspection of tile flooring that is in process of being laid over the old concrete floor in the main exhibition hall.
The 4-acre floor gradually is assuming the appearance of a brilliant, polished ballroom floor, observes declared.
Hard concrete which made Farm Show visitors tired after the first mile or two of walking through exhibits, is being covered with a mastic asphalt base upon which Spanish red asphalt tile are being set.

The tiles are 9 x 9 inches in size made of asphalt, asbestos fiber, resin and coloring matter. Commission members say the new flooring is classified as "resilient" and in addition to making walking much "easier on the feet" they believe there will be less dust and noise.
Nearly one-third of a million pieces of the tile, each three-sixteenths of an inch in thickness, will be required to complete the new flooring job, according to representatives of Hager Brothers, Inc., of Lancaster, who received the contract to improve the main Farm Show building floor.

It required four weeks for workmen to get the old concrete floor in shape to receive its new covering, they say. All major depressions were filled in and the new floor will be smooth and level. It is expected that the job will be finished by early November, in plenty of time for the 1948 Farm Show, January 12 to 16.
A minimum of dust is assured because the new floor covering is lightly waxed and polished and will be maintained in that condition by the Farm Show Commission.

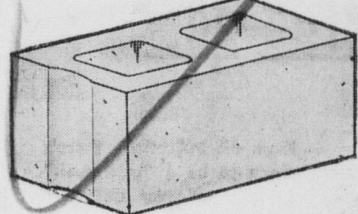

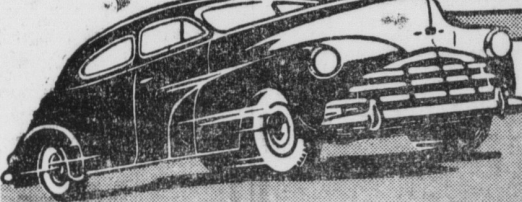
