Dr. Florence Selbert, professor of biochemistry at the Henry Phipps Institute, University of Pennsylvania, plants tubercle bacilli from seed culture to bottles for mass production. 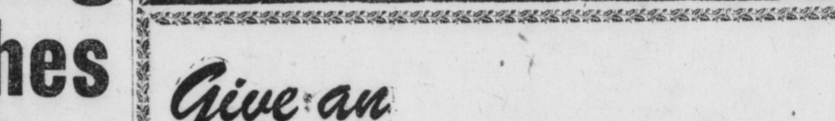
