reported 7,976,000 gallons of water pumped in November.  
Fire Chief John J. Schroll reported one fire during the month with \$1500 damage to an automobile.  
The Board of Health reported no cases quarantined, one nuisance corrected.  
Chief of Police Elmer Zerphey reported 5 prosecutions, 960 miles travelled, 34 gal. of gasoline and 4 qts. of oil purchased.  
Treasurer's report showed the following balances: boro account, \$1,946.57; water, \$6,989.62; liquid fuels and tax account, \$611.64.  
Council decided to hold the final meeting of the year on Monday, December 29th.  
It was decided to order the necessary parts to fix the pumps

**Cleaning Utensils**  
The method used in cleaning scorched food from utensils is determined by the material from which the utensil is made. Try filling the container with cold water above the scorched surface, then bringing it to a boil. If this fails, try the following: For iron, use a steel wool scraper; for tin or enamel, add three tablespoons of soda to a quart of water and boil; for aluminum, boil strong vinegar water. In it, clean with fine steel wool when food is loosened and don't use soda or coarse scrubbing brushes, and for glassware, use a wooden scraper which will not scratch.

**U. N. Personnel**  
Within the secretariat of the United Nations are employees representing 52 nationalities and 25 stateless people. The United States has the highest percentage of employees, with 53.8 per cent of the 2,863 staff members. France ranks second with 10.9 per cent. Salary-wise, the secretariat is divided into six categories, with pay ranging from \$1,380 to \$20,000.

**Rotary Expands**  
Since the end of the war, Rotary clubs have been re-established in 16 countries. Clubs of the international service group have been reorganized in Belgium, Burma, China, Czechoslovakia, France, Greece, Hong Kong, Luxembourg, Italy, Malaya, Norway, Siam, the Marianas, the Netherlands, the Netherlands Indies and the Philippines.

**Allied Sports**  
Twenty-five competitive sports have been participated in by army personnel in the European occupation zone as part of the broad athletic program sponsored by army special services. The project also has included international competition in 14 different sports.

**Devil Ray Tows Boat**  
When a giant blue-striped devil ray became entangled in the anchor ropes of a 16-foot motor boat inside the Great Barrier reef, near Innisfail, Queensland, it towed the boat a mile out to sea. The ray was estimated at about seven feet long, weighing nearly a ton.
