Out in Arizona last Fall there was an exceptional crop of grapefruit. The state's grapefruit program committee has limited its growers' weekly shipments to 25,-000 packed boxes. There is however a surplus, and to date growers have hauled tons of the fruit on large piles covering an acre of desert. To market them would reduce the price.
