

Why Prices Are High

Our readers will remember not so many years ago pork was rather low in price and as a stimulant to prices the Government created a shortage by killing off the hogs.

A few years later when wheat prices were down, the Government gave farmers orders as to just how many acres they could sow. If they obeyed, farmers received a bonus. Some had sown too much in the preceding fall so the following spring they plowed the excess acreage under.

Out in Arizona last fall there was an exceptional crop of grapefruit. The state's grapefruit program committee has limited its growers' weekly shipments to 25,000 packed boxes. There is however a surplus, and to date growers have hauled tons of the fruit on large piles covering an acre of desert. To market them would reduce the price.

At the same time the state of Arizona is seeking food for its needy Navajo Indians and starving Europeans.

If those responsible for the destruction of any edible, after God provided the rain and the sunshine to grow same, are not held responsible and punished directly or indirectly, many of us, like the writer, will do some "tall thinking."

During World War II everybody learned that in order to keep

prices of anything "way up," be it vegetable, beef, washing machine or auto, simply create a supposed shortage and the buying public just goes nuts. Then it will even buy and store, where ordinarily, what's the use.

Last fall the Government bought wheat, potatoes, etc. and naturally prices remained high because a supposed shortage was created.

But, according to our way of thinking, manufacturers kept a keen eye on the Government and thereby learned that marketing only a portion of its peacetime production, would also create a demand, keep the public fighting to procure what it needed and at the same time at high prices.

The manufacturer will alibi can't get this or can't get that, but it seems like a lot of hooey. The manner in which many products are marketed today, to us looks like plain rationing if you please. There are, however, exceptions.

If you think we're wrong, go to some farm sale and watch buyers pay hundreds of dollars more for four and five year old used machinery than the cost of new. WHY, because there is very little available.

Up at the State Farm Show we heard several farmers try to buy tractors. They were told there are none available even at a premium. This same thing was (Turn to Page 2)

Nissly Tobacco Warehouse, Florin Gutted By Fire

Battling in sub-freezing temperatures, firemen from four towns early Tuesday extinguished a fire that badly damaged the H. Roy Nissly tobacco warehouse, Florin. Firemen froze to their ladders, hose lines broke and fire fighting equipment was disabled by the severe cold which quickly turned to ice the water poured on the fire. The Florin reservoir was drained dry but pumps were started and the supply of water replenished that morning.

Mr. Nissly estimated the damage to the building at \$10,000 and said the warehouse contained tobacco valued at \$30,000. Because of the ice, firemen said, it is impossible to examine the tobacco to determine whether any of the cased goods is safe. Mr. Nissly said the damage is fully covered by insurance.
