2 Railroad Crossings Will Make The Road Relocation Expensive

At a hearing at Harrisburg Thursday, the Public Utility Commission was informed that two new railroad crossings at a cost of nearly \$1,000,000 will be necessary in connection with the proposed change of the Harrisburg pike from a point two miles east of town to Lancaster.

The PUC must approve any changes in grade crossings before the actual construction of the new highway link can be started by the State Highways Department. There has been no estimate on the cost of the entire project.

At an initial hearing on the crossings Thursday, State Highways Department engineers explained two major crossing projects are planned.

The first will be over the tracks of the Reading Company railroad's

Columbia branch North of Landisville. It will cost, with approaches, an estimated \$340,000.

The second crossing will be a bridge over the Reading Company tracks near Lancaster. Also involved in this project are alterations of crossings on connecting roads over four tracks of the Pennsylvania Railroad's main line. Engineers estimated the cost of this job at \$627,000.

The Highway Department already has announced relocation of the Harrisburg pike North of the present route will be undertaken sometime this year. The project calls for a new road starting two miles East of Mount Joy and ending 1 and 1-2 miles West of Lancaster.

Representatives of the Pennsylvania and Reading Railroads attended the hearings.

Florin 'Cyclist Injured In Spill

Lloyd Nentwig, thirty-three, of Florin, was admitted to the St. Joseph's Hospital Tuesday shortly after he was knocked from his motorcycle by a trailer truck at the intersection of Route 220 and Engle Streets in Florin at 4:15 p.m. State Policeman Sebastian Nagle reported.

Hospital authorities said Nentwig, who suffered internal injuries in the accident, was in good condition late Tuesday night.

According to State Police, Nentwig was traveling north on Engle Street in Florin and came to a complete stop at the intersection of Route 220. A trailer truck operated by Edward R. Moffet, thirty, 328 1-2 Market Street, New Cumberland, also traveling north, stopped abreast of Nentwig at the intersection. As the truck pulled out onto the highway, witnesses said, the side of the trailer struck the handle bars of the motorcycle causing it to upset, throwing Nentwig against the side of the trailer.

The injured rider was treated at the scene by Dr. R. M. Thome of Mt. Joy. St. Joseph's Hospital ambulance later conveyed Nentwig to the hospital where he was admitted as a patient.
