The third and final meeting is slated for Friday, in the Quarryville High School for Farm-Game Project Number 30, embracing Colerain, East Drumore, Little Britain and Fulton Townships. This session will be in charge of Game Protector John Eicholtz.

All of these meetings, which are planned as annual affairs, have been arranged by the county's three Game Protectors and Deputy Robert McKain, of Marietta, a member of the Game Commission's Special Service Corps.

This shipment, consisting of rainbow and brown trout, arrived at the Landisville Post Office at 10 a.m. Wednesday and the fish were stocked immediately in Swarr's run and Long's run.

Sportsmen in the area participated in the stocking activities. At the same time Greener reported that the first shipment of trout arrived, as scheduled, Monday morning at the Marietta Post Office. These fish were stocked in Donegal creek, Donegal Springs branch, Gladfelter's run and Charles run.

Sportsmen Member's Now Numbers 517

The Mount Joy Sportsmen's Association held their monthly meeting on Monday, March 8, 1948 with seventeen members present. There were ten new members and thirty-nine renewals admitted which made a total of 517 paid members.

Forty-five birds died by the state, 131 hens, 33 cock birds, 112 rabbits, which were trapped in Snyder's Orchard, and 89 rabbits trapped in Mount Joy Borough were released in Rapho, Mount Joy and East Donegal townships.
