

MOTORISTS WARNED OF DANGEROUS HIGHWAYS

A warning of dangerous highway conditions is given by the Keystone Automobile Club.

If you are going to drive at night, drive at a speed that will permit you to make a quick stop in safety as damaged paving is apt to be encountered, due to the severity of the weather and accompanying storms in the last two months.

Damaged highways present a problem of serious concern to motorists. The condition is so general that highway departments obviously cannot put all roads in safe condition immediately.

Pending repairs, therefore, it is up to the motorist to look to his own safety and drive with care, especially at night. The road hazards are more readily apparent in daylight, but under night driving conditions breaks in pavement are not so easily discernible.

MORE WHEAT, BARLEY ON HAND, LESS CORN

According to recent surveys, farmers of Pennsylvania have less corn but more wheat and barley on hand than a year ago.

A Federal-State survey in January showed corn holdings at 35,408,000 bushels or two per cent less than at the same time a year earlier; wheat stocks at 7,581,000, three per cent more than a year previous and five per cent above the 10-year average, 1937-46; oats holdings totaled about 13 million bushels, 32 per cent down; barley at 2,435,000 bushels was seven per cent up and 34 per cent above average. Hay stocks on January 1 were eight per cent below those of a year previous, but eight per cent above average.

Week's Best Recipe

Flake Gems: 1 c sifted flour, 4 T sugar, 1-2 t salt, 3 t baking powder, 1 egg, 1-2 c milk, 4 T melted shortening, 2 c wheat flakes or corn flakes. Sift flour, sugar, salt and baking powder together. Beat egg until light, add milk, then stir into dry ingredients. Just before completely blended, add cooled shortening and stir just enough to mix ingredients. Carefully fold in wheat flakes. Pour into greased muffin cups, filling each cup two-thirds full. Bake immediately for 20 - 25 minutes in a moderately hot oven. Yield: 1 dozen medium size muffins.

Hungarian Potatoes

Wash and peel and slice thin, six medium potatoes. Sauté potatoes in three tablespoons of hot shortening until tender; then turn into baking dish. Mix together two cups cottage cheese, three tablespoons sour cream, two eggs and salt. Pour over potatoes. Bake in slow oven ten minutes, until cheese is set. Yield is about six servings.

To get rid of musty odors in the cellar or basement, sprinkle a little chloride of lime on the floor. As soon as mustiness disappears, sweep up the lime and scrub the floor - Be sure umbrellas are thoroughly dry before they are put away or they are likely to mildew - Clean hot air registers with the suction attachment of the vacuum cleaner.
