Farm Boys - Girls Urged To Consider Dairy Business

Lancaster county farm boys and girls, 10 to 20 years of age, are urged to consider 4-H Dairying as one of their projects for the year. "Max" Smith, Assistant County Agent in charge of the club program in the county, states that "the dairy project is one of the most instructive projects offered to farm youth."

The dairy project requires that each club member starts with a registered heifer calf from two to twelve months of age; the calf should be of good type and conformation and be out of a cow with good production records. This calf is developed for the first two years in the project and the third year freshens with the club member keeping production records. Information of feeding, management, judging dairy cattle, fitting and showing, and record keeping is furnished.

It is not necessary for the home herd of the club member to be Accredited from T. B. or Certified from Bang's disease in order to enroll in the dairy project, but if the animal is to be shown at the County Roundup, at the District Show, or at the State Farm Show, the herd must meet this requirement. In other words, the member may join the club, attend the meetings, and get the same educational information as the others, except that the calf cannot be shown. In (Turn to page 3)

Vet Killed By a Train Between Here & Salunga

A former sergeant in the U. S. Air Force was killed when struck by a train on the Pennsylvania Railroad, half a mile west of Salunga, Monday morning.

State Police identified the victim as Joseph G. Pucalik, thirty-one, 566 W. Fifth Ave., McKeesport, Pa.

The body was discovered by the crew of a passing westbound train and reported to railroad authorities when the train reached Harrisburg, Sgt. Joseph Duesmith, of the PRR police, and State Police investigated.

Dr. David E. Schlosser, deputy coroner here, expressed the theory that the victim may have committed suicide, but said he would reserve final decision until he has contacted Dr. M. H. Yoder, county coroner, Lititz.

Dr. Schlosser said the suicide theory was substantiated by the fact that Pucalik's suitcase, with the contents intact, was found standing along the eastbound rails on the south side of the railroad tracks. The man had apparently walked over to the westbound tracks on the north side of the railroad bed.

Later Dr. Schlosser issued a verdict of suicide.

The man was struck at a point 20 yards west of the overhead bridge on the Harrisburg pike, west of Salunga. The passing train crew discovered the body at 7:15 a.m. and Dr. Schlosser said the victim apparently had been struck

by a westbound train around 6:30 a.m.

State Policeman Leonard Mazakas said identification was made from cards and papers found on the victim. Army papers found on the victim showed that Pucalik was a sergeant when discharged from the Air Force at Drew Field, Florida, in 1945. He is married and believed the father of one child, police said.

The discharge papers, police added, gave his wife's address as Cassadago R1, N. Y.

So far, police said they have been unable to trace the victim's whereabouts before his body was found.

Members of Pucalik's family said that Pucalik has not been home since he was discharged from the service at Drew Field, Fla., in 1945. Pucalik was separated from his wife, who is believed to be somewhere in Buffalo, N. Y. Army papers show he was a sergeant at the time of his discharge.

Roy Sheetz, local funeral director, said that he has been notified by the victim's family that the body will not be claimed, and the American Legion Post volunteered to bury Pucalik, a veteran of World War II.

The Walter S. Ebersole Post No. 185 American Legion held services Tuesday at 6 p.m. Rev. John H. Gable, pastor of the Evangelical United Brethren Church, Florida, had charge of the service. Interment was made in Mount Joy cemetery.

VETERANS ARE EXEMPT FROM DOING JURY DUTY

Some 27,000 Lancaster countians, veterans of U. S. military service, don't have to serve on jury duty if they don't want to.

The reason lies in a 23-year-old state law exempting persons with nine months of wartime military service or nine years in the National Guard. That gives about 20 per cent of the local citizenry an "out" if they care to use it.

All they have to do is tell the judge or jury commissioners about it and they are excused automatically.

TRUCK CRASHES, DRIVER ESCAPES, CARGO BURNED
