Two Lancaster Firms Low Bidders On The New Highway

John H. Swanger and C. W. Good, Lancaster road contractors, submitted the lowest bids for the rebuilding of the Harrisburg Pike between Mount Joy and Lancaster, the State Highway Department, who opened the bids in Harrisburg Friday, announced.

Swanger submitted a bid of \$1,363,126 for the construction of 4.81 miles in Rapho and East Hempfield Township. Good submitted a bid of \$1,153,479 for the rebuilding of 2.50 miles of the road in East Hempfield and Manheim townships, including bridges over the Little Conestoga Creek and Reading railroad tracks.

Officials said they will relay the bids to the Public Roads Administration in Washington with a recommendation that they be accepted. The Federal government has promised to pay half the construction cost.

"Construction will start as soon as possible thereafter," a State Highways spokesman said. (Turn to Page 2)
