A 4000 Mile Trip

River which passes through it. It is just about the most beautiful we ever saw. Most streets are very wide with palm trees and other flowering trees on each side as far as you can see. Canal St., which is the main business street, is 170 feet wide and many miles long. Flowers such as century plants, blooming and many other flowering trees in bloom. We visited millionaires row which street is closed at one end with steel gates and padlocked. We entered the French section with all the fancy metal lattis work around the buildings. We inspected the city's drainage system which is below sea level. They have canals mostly under ground where the rain water is drained from the streets and immense pumping stations pump this water up into the Mississippi River which at this point is 200 feet deep and 1000 feet wide. When this river is at flood stage gates are opened at the north end of the city and some of the water is left to go into the bay, but for the reason that this river carries a lot of mud these gates are normally closed.

Next the one thing that a visitor never forgets is how the dead are disposed of. None are buried in the ground, none are embalmed after death. Reason the water is only about two feet below the ground. How they are cremated without fire, in the cemeteries are what look like double bake ovens but square on the top. There is a top and bottom compartment. The body is placed in a coffin in the top compartment and sealed with brick and mortar and in one year's time the sun will have the body cremated except the skull and a few of the larger bones. After one year if another death happens in the family, the vault is opened the few bones are pushed down to the bottom compartment, the metal and very little of the coffin are removed and given the ash man. This we saw the day we were in the cemetery. There was a funeral while we were there.

After making several trips into the city we left for the west on the most southern road of U S A We crossed the famous Huey P. Long bridge which must have been an engineers headache. This bridge is 400 feet high from the bottom of the river and 4 1-2 miles long, four lane auto drive and two railroad tracks. The incline for the railroads are of steel and several miles away.

Leaving on route 90 in a semi-tropical country we saw hundreds of banana trees, blue bonnet flowers by the millions, palm trees, Spanish moss, sugarcane, cotton rice ponds, bullfrog ponds. There are also stray alligators along this route. On reaching Texas we came to large watermelon fields which were ripe. You could buy them by the piece or whole on ice but no cheaper than you can buy them here at home.

After traveling many miles in Texas we crossed over into Arkansas only to find it about the same, when we again turned West into Oklahoma where we visited Mr. Lupold and family, who moved into Oklahoma from Mt. Joy some years ago. They live in a small town named Gans. We found him busy finishing the church he built which will be dedicated on June 20th with Mr. Summy of town assisting. Mr. Lupold lives about 2 1-2 miles from a main auto route in almost level country which is a good farming section. In a few weeks this town will have telephones, electric lights and gas they already have. On leaving this town of about 15 or 20 homes we headed for the Ozarks where I got the surprise of my life. The Ozarks reach, for my guess, about 600 miles with many beautiful state parks and the most beautiful green mountain scenery I ever saw. I'm sorry to say but the sky line drive in Virginia does not even have a lookin.

Here we visited the largest fresh water spring in the world, it discharges 847 million gallons per day. The stream that leaves the spring compares to the big Connecticut Creek. Next we stopped in the town of Ozark of about 2,000 population situated in the most beautiful part of the country, this being our last sight seeing place we started for home.

At all modern motels, as they call them, which have all conveniences, rates \$2.00 to \$5.00 per night or two. Food very good and one third cheaper than at home. Gasoline regular five gallons from \$1.15 to \$1.48, miles traveled 4,000, trouble one fan belt and had to have radiator washed out, no night traveling. This was one of the most beautiful, pleasant and interesting trips we ever have taken.

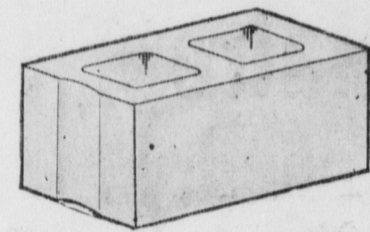
