ZINK AND FELLEBAUM WIN IN TENNIS TOURNAY

Two local college netmen, Robert Zink of Franklin and Marshall College and Harold Fellenbaum of Elizabethtown College, advanced through the opening day of play in the Eastern Intercollegiate tennis tournament at Montclair, N.J. Tuesday.

Zink whipped Joseph Haggerty, Fordham, 6-2 and 6-0, in the first round, while Fellenbaum downed Austin K. Haldenstein, University of Miami, 6-2 and 6-2, in the second round.

Frank Zink of Elizabethtown College lost to J. Badger, Yale, 3-4 and 6-3, in the second round. The F. Zink and Fellenbaum doubles team lost to the team of Vincent and Johnson from Miami, 6-4 and 6-4.

Pasture Improvement
Pasture improvement will pay this year as never before. It will mean greater milk production with less imported feed. It will mean greater beef production per acre and per animal. It will even mean greater poultry production. Chickens don't chew a cud, but they graze, just as do cattle, and a little green grazing for the flock during the spring, summer and fall will keep up egg production and save as much as 20 per cent on the feed bill.

First Furniture Piece
