## Clipped 3 Days Off Hunt'g Season

This year's small game hunting season will be three days shorter than usual.

The State Game Commission has said the four-week open season for wild turkey, ringneck pheasant, rabbit and squirrel hunting will start Nov. 1 and end Nov. 27, including four Saturdays.

Wild turkey, however, will be restricted to two weeks in 12 of our counties and banned entirely in 24 others. Last year 11 counties were closed and 100 had short seasons.

The groundhog season which opened July 1 will continue through Nov. 27 instead of ending Sept. 30.

The Game Commission said it found considerable sentiment for an antlerless deer season in some counties but decided it would be wise to wait until next year before again establishing such a season.

Other seasons set by the commission at its July meeting include the following:

Deer - Nov. 29 through December 11, with fair game limited this year everywhere to antlered buck.

Bear - November 15 through November 20, with individual sportsmen limited to one bruin, a year or more old, in the season and hunting parties to two.

Grouse - A one week season, Nov. 1 through Nov. 6, with the design of increasing the supply.

Bobwhite Quail and Hungarian Partridges - Nov. 1 through Nov. 13, a reduction of two weeks to give bobwhites a chance to re-establish themselves.

The commission explained its broader restrictions on wild turkey hunting are designed to give the game in bear territory a sporting chance.

Counties with the short season will be Cameron, Clearfield, Clinton, Elk, Jefferson, Lycoming, McKean, Potter, Snyder, Sullivan, Tioga, and Union. Hunting turkeys is banned entirely in Adams, Bradford, Carbon, Clarion, Columbia, Cumberland, Fayette, Forest, Lackawanna, Luzerne, Monroe, Montour, Northampton, Northumberland, Pike, Schuylkill, Susquehanna, Venango, Warren, Wayne, Westmoreland, Wyoming and York Counties and that part of Somerset North of the turnpike.
