For the hoisting and storage chore now can be guided by one man from a place on the wagen In operation, hav is lifted, as desired to an overhead track in the mow as the hoisting rope winds around a drum. It moves along the carrier until the operator stops its progress and releases the load. kilowatt hour of power per ton.
The silo unloader was designed to put another farm "hand job" mechanical basis and to eliminate many miles of weary climbing. The unloading mechanism hangs over the ensilage and follows it down as the silo is emptied. Curved blades, which are attached to a rotating boom, "work" the ensilage to the center of the silo where it is blown down the chute. The unloader is operated by a control switch and timer device on the barn floor. 
