5 Cars In Tangle Here Sunday; No One Badly Injured

Five cars were implicated in a tangle on East Main street after the rain early Sunday evening.

The first of five cars traveling West, stopped in front of Dr. E. W. Newcomer's residence. The second car crashed into the rear of no. 1 car, no. 3 stopped quite a distance from the above scene when car no. 4 banged into the rear of no. 3 and car no. 5 crashed into the rear of car no. 3.

The latter two cars had a number of children as passengers, all of whom were jolted but fortunately none of the passengers in any of the cars were badly injured. A lady in no. 4 was slightly cut and bruised about the legs.

The cars didn't fare so well. The entire grill in no. 5 was mashed. On all others the damage was slight.

None of these cars were from this locality.

Sheriff Destroys \$500 Worth Fireworks

A cloud of smoke mushroomed 1000 feet when county authorities and firemen destroyed \$500 worth of confiscated fireworks on the farm of Paul and Iona Metzger, Mt. Joy R2. Mrs. Metzger is a deputy sheriff of Lancaster County.

The fireworks were seized in a raid late in June, at the home of Mrs. Anna Hauck, thirty-seven, Newville, Elizabethtown R1. At the time the merchandise was described as the "biggest seizure of fireworks in the county" since a State law was passed in 1939 forbidding sale and use of fireworks except by special permission.

The display attracted spectators from miles around to see the Roman candles, sky rockets, torpedoes, fountains, sparklers and red lights destroyed. The fireworks were put in a pile, gasoline was poured on, and a torch thrown in.

The firing was in charge of Sheriff Abe Lane; Elmer Zerphey, deputy sheriff, and Ray Myers, Mt. Joy Fire Chief.

Being Brought Here For Burial

The body of Pfc. William R. Shoup, Mount Joy, is one of the five hundred thirty-four Pennsylvania World War II dead of the 5,864 American dead who have been returned to the United States from Europe aboard the United States Army Transport Lawrence Victory, Lt. Colonel C. R. Yost, Chief of the American Graves Registration Division at the Philadelphia Quartermaster Depot announced today.

Armed forces dead originally interred in temporary military cemeteries in France are among those brought back to this country.

From New York, the Pennsylvania dead will be shipped to regional Quartermaster distribution centers, where individual military escorts of the same rank, race and arm of service as the deceased will be assigned to escort the caskets to final destinations selected by the next of kin.

Pfc. Shoup is a brother to Mrs. Johnson Martin, of this place. The Martins conduct a 5 and 10 cent store on East Main street.

The Martin family and the mother of the deceased soldier, Mrs. Magdalene Shoup, also of town, are spending the Summer in a cottage at Long Level. They formerly resided at Denora, near Pittsburgh.

2 Cars Damaged In Collision Here

Two cars were badly damaged in a collision involving three cars at the Chocolate Ave.-Donegal Springs Road intersection on Saturday.

The accident occurred when Jacob Sontz drove his car onto Donegal Springs Road on Chocolate Avenue; and a Harrisburg motorist, on his way to Ocean City was driving towards town on Donegal Springs Road, now being used as a detour.
