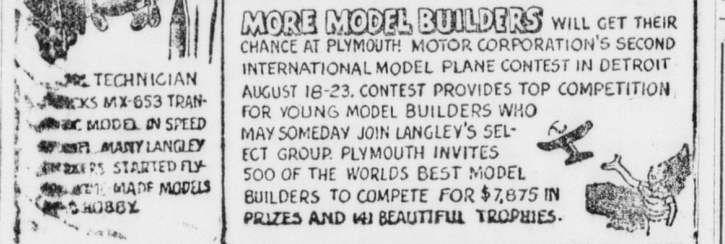
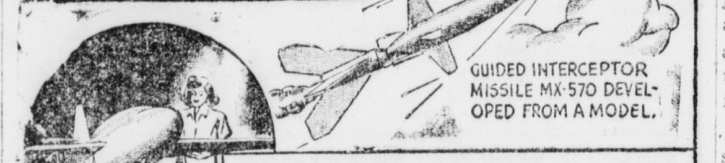
EENEFTI SOFTBALL GAME WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 1
