Landisville Man A Crash Victim

S-Sgt. Clarence O. Paulsen, 27, son of Mrs. Katie Paulsen, Landisville, very well known here, was one of the victims of the crash at the Hawaiian air field when sixteen Air Force men were killed at Hickman Field, Honolulu.

"We all knew what was coming," said S-Sgt. Donald D. Kienholz, hero of a B-29 crash.

Kienholz, of Pasco and Spokane, Wash., one of the four injured survivors, fought his way out of the burning wreck. Then, with clothing aflame and despite broken ribs, he rushed back and rescued a man identified as Sgt. Harry C. Larsen of Los Angeles.

Interviewed Thursday in Tripler Hospital, Kienholz said he was not sure whom he had saved.

He said the plane was barely airborne on its flight from Barbers Point for Okinawa when Larsen shouted over the intercommunications telephone that one engine

Willis S. Lindenmuth, sixty-one, Maytown, pleaded guilty to beating his wife, Mae Lindenmuth, sixty, with a ball hammer on the night of June 19. He was fined \$100 and costs and sentenced to 2 to 5 years in the county prison on charges of assault and battery with intent to kill.

State Policeman Schappert, who testified for Pvt. Rufus Williams, the prosecutor, said Mrs. Lindenmuth suffered a fractured skull and several sutures were required at St. Joseph's Hospital to close the wounds inflicted by her husband with the hammer. He read Williams report which stated Lindenmuth had made previous threats to harm his wife and had improvised various weapons which were confiscated.
