At Mt. Joy High School located at the end of Poplar street and one and one-half blocks southward from Marietta Street, the meeting will be held on the Athletic Field. Police Chase Boys

Trooper John J. Stafford, the cars reached speeds of 100-miles-per-hour, and some 20-odd road workmen, resurfacing Route 230 between Florin and Elizabethtown, narrowly escaped being run down when the boys crashed through a road barricade.

The boys, identified by police as Arthur Dallison, and David Hozier, both of East Liberty, Pittsburgh, admitted stealing the automobile in Philadelphia and are being held for investigators in that city. They were committed to the Rotary Home.

Stafford noticed the 1947 model automobile being driven toward Elizabethtown by the two young boys at 8:40 a. m.

His suspicions were aroused by the apparent youthfulness of the two occupants and the officer decided to stop the vehicle to investigate. When he signalled for the vehicle to stop, the driver of the car, Dallison, immediately increased his speed and tried to flee.

Pvt. Stafford, took up the pursuit and soon the vehicles were racing through Salunga and Mt. Joy at a high rate of speed.

The boys continued through Mt. Joy on Route 230 and with the siren on the police cruiser wailing headed thru Florin. At Florin they crashed thru a barricade erected for the detour.

Some 20-odd workmen were sent running for safety as the automobile bore down on them. Meanwhile, several warning shots were fired by Pvt. Stafford in an effort to get the boys to stop.

Police said they ignored the shots however, and proceeded thru the heart of Elizabethtown where they attempted to outsmart the officer by making a left turn onto Hummelstown Street.

This decision, eventually led to their apprehension as Hummelstown Street led to the borough water works and a dead end.

When the boys saw they could proceed no further by automobile, they jumped from the car and fled into a wooded section.

Pvt. Stafford radioed the Lancaster Barracks informing them the boys had abandoned the vehicle and fled into the woods.

Several radio cars of the Lancaster Barracks and two containing officers of the Harrisburg Barracks were ordered to the scene to search the woods.

The Officers combed the wooded section but were unable to locate the boys because of the high grass and dense thickets.

By this time, however, most of the residents in the area were alerted and when the boys emerged onto Route 230 from the woods near Baker's Diner, Kenneth Baker, the proprietor, notified police.

Pvt. Stafford went to the diner and with Baker's help took the boys into custody shortly before noon Thursday.

When questioned later Thursday, police reported the boys told them they stole the automobile in Philadelphia about 6 a. m. Thursday. Police said the automobile was recovered before the owners, Edward Cohen, and Harry Snyder, 700 W. Garland St., Philadelphia, reported it stolen.

Police said neither of the boys had much previous driving experience nor an operator's license. They said their home was in Pittsburgh, but they had left there several weeks ago with another youth.

The other boy, served time in a reform school for stealing auto and told the two 16-year-olds how to cross the ignition wires of an automobile in order to start it without a key.

The boys, police said, told them they did this in Pittsburgh and stole an automobile which they drove to Harrisburg. In Harrisburg, the boys took another vehicle and went to the state of Conn.

Abandoning the vehicle, they again swiped another auto and went to Philadelphia where they exchanged it for the one owned by Cohen and Snyder, which they were driving on Route 230 when the officer became suspicious.

Police said both boys will probably be turned over to Philadelphia authorities.

Two 15-year-old East Liberty boys who were cow-boying thru here last Thursday and later arrested by State Policeman John Stafford after a chase on the Harrisburg Pike between Salunga and Elizabethtown, will be returned to the Allegheny County Juvenile Detention Home from which they escaped Aug. 30. The boys were involved in three auto thefts in Pittsburgh, Harrisburg and Philadelphia.

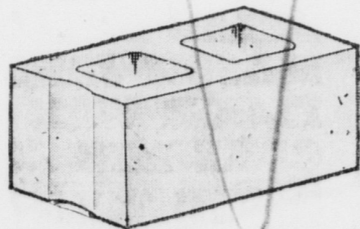
