Ephrata, Pa., area veterans of World World II who are eligible and have not received Victory medals or other awards to which they are entitled, are requested to appear at the band platform at the Ephrata Street Fair, Friday night, September 22, at 8:30 p. m. where a public presentation will be made by representatives of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps, it was announced by C. Ray Numbers, Fair president.

All three branches of the armed forces will be represented at the 30th annual event which will open Wednesday night with a street parade at 6:30 p. m. Last year the parade drew an estimated more than 40,000 visitors to Ephrata, home of the famous Cloisters.

The four day fair program features tonight evening free entertainment, many interesting exhibits of farm, garden, arts and crafts and unexcelled Lancaster County Dutch cooking.

In the event of inclement weather the parade will be postponed until Thursday, September 23 at the same time.
