OKLAHOMA PICTURES TO BE SHOWN AT CALVARY CHURCH

During the early part of the
 Summer a group of four members
 from the Calvary Church accom-
 panied by the Pastor made a trip
 to Oklahoma where, besides visit-
 ing with the Lupold's and sharing
 in the dedication services of the
 church building, they surveyed the
 needs of the unchurched and un-
 reached in Oklahoma.
 Enroute to that area and while

they were there with the Lupold's,
 formerly of Mount Joy, Pastor
 Summy took a large number of
 35mm photos in Kodachrome and
 several rolls of 8mm movies also
 in Kodachrome. In the main, these
 pictures deal with the work the
 Lupold's are carrying on in Gans.
 The pictures have since been pro-
 cessed and are ready to be shown.
 The date set for showing these
 pictures is Sunday, October 3 at
 7:30 p.m. Many folk have expressed
 a desire to learn more about the
 work in Oklahoma, and have been
 awaiting anxiously the time when
 these pictures would be shown.

A hearty invitation is extended
 to all the friends of the Lupold's
 and the Calvary Bible Church to
 share in the inspiration of this ser-
 vice. This week another family
 from the Church left for Oklahoma
 to begin an itinerant, evangelistic
 ministry among the children. Their
 desire is to start a series of Bible
 Clubs for the youngsters. These
 pictures will reveal something of
 the need in this field among the
 children.

tion Education by the Rev. D. Le-
 roy Fegley, Lancaster.
 The session set the pastors' min-
 imum salary for the next conference
 year at \$2,200 and a home, the stand-
 ard at \$2,700 and a home.

The session further urged the
 churches to endeavor to reach the
 standard. The Rev. Dr. O. T. Ehr-
 hart, of Lancaster Covenant EUB
 Church, who was elected sec-
 retary of the Conference Tuesday,
 was secretary of the Council of Ad-
 ministration, which submitted the
 recommendation. The salary ad-
 vances were made through a move-
 ment of laymen attending the an-
 nual session.

At the Tuesday evening session,
 the Rev. Stanley B. Williams, D. D.
 of Dayton, Ohio, representing the
 Denominational Home Mission So-
 ciety, told more than 200 ministers
 and lay leaders that "leaders of
 Christian thought today can ac-
 count for the present debacle of
 our Western Civilization only on
 the hypothesis that the Evil One is
 in charge of present world govern-
 ments." He added that "the only
 ray of light upon our world hori-
 zon comes from the mission field."

Church Last 25 Years
 Dr. Williams said that the aver-
 age church in America takes 25
 years to reach the zenith of its in-

fluence in the community, after
 which it usually begins a slow, sad,
 sorrowful decline until it finally
 passes out of existence. "Mission-
 aries do not need the help of the
 Church at home as much as the
 Church needs missionaries," he
 stated.

"Eight thousand missionaries
 sent to Japan a generation ago
 would probably have prevented the
 war that took 80,000 lives of our
 finest young men. . . all of the Prot-
 estant Churches in America did
 not give enough to foreign missions
 in 1940 to build the battleship Mis-
 sissippi," the Ohio minister said. He
 also asserted that no church may
 be said to be entirely self-support-
 ing which does not send forth at
 least one new missionary or min-
 ister each ten years.

The Rev. H. E. Schaeffer, D. D.,
 of the Pennbrook Church, was also
 a speaker at the Tuesday evening
 session. He told the group that
 "the question the church faces is:
 "Can the church of our day do for
 the world and our generation as
 the Apostolic Church of the first
 century did for its day and gener-
 ation?"

Herald Circulation High

In a report of the Publication
 Board, submitted Tuesday after-
 noon by the Rev. Paul E. Fridinger,
 Elizabethtown, it was revealed
 that the circulation of the Confer-
 ence Herald has reached the un-
 precedented number of 4,411 sub-
 scribers.

The Rev. C. E. Ulrich, of Col-
 onial Park, Harrisburg, reporting for
 the Conference Board of Trustees,
 requested that the Conference have
 the Board of Managers of the Mt.
 Gretna Campmeeting Association
 renovate and winterize all or part
 of the Christian Education Build-
 ing for Church and Sunday School
 purposes for the Mount Gretna
 congregation and that the expense
 be cared for by the Conference.

The report of the Board of
 Christian Education was presented
 by the Rev. D. LeRoy Fegley, of
 the Otterbier EUB Church, of
 Lancaster. "Next year, three sep-
 arate age group camps will be held
 at Mt. Gretna," the report stated in
 part. "Dormitory and dining room
 facilities will be provided in Otter-
 bier Lodge. Each camp will have
 a camp director, assistant director,
 registrar and counselors. Each
 camp will be in session for one
 week.

"The schedule of Camps follows:
 Senior High Camp (ages 15, 16, 17),
 June 19 to 26; Junior High Camp
 (ages 12, 13, 14), June 26 to July 3;

Young People's Camp (ages 18 to
 24), July 3 to 10; Youth Director's
 Camp, July 8 and 9; Junior Camp,
 (ages 9, 10, and 11), July 17 to 23.
 The Adult Camp, Aug. 2 to Aug. 7,
 is in connection with the Mt. Gre-
 tna Bible Conference. There will also
 be a Youth Director's Camp for
 Youth Directors of local churches on
 June 24 and June 25. Finally, there
 will be a Young People's Week-end
 Assembly July 15, 16, and 17," the
 report concluded.

Wednesday
 The Rev. Dr. Praetorius, who is
 bishop of the Northwestern Area,
 EUB Church, was the principal
 speaker at the evening session
 which concludes here this evening,
 at which time the report of the
 Stationing Committee will be read.
 "All great men are simple men,"
 the bishop said, pointing out that
 when one finds a man, supposedly
 great, who cannot be reached with
 a "ten foot pole," he is not very
 great. Rev. Praetorius said the
 greatest words in our vocabulary
 are the simple words which include
 faith, love, home, God and the
 great things in life are the simple
 things.

It was reported that last year's
 enrollment of 1176, which was the
 largest in the history of the College
 with 817 full-time students, 445 of
 which were veterans. Five foreign
 countries, 12 states and 21 countries
 were represented in this enrollment.

 It was announced that Rev. H. S.
 Kiefer, after having completed 44
 years in the pastorate, was granted,
 at his own request, retired relation-
 ship. Rev. Kiefer was pastor of the
 church at Elizabethtown. It was
 during the Rev. Mr. Kiefer's pas-
 torate that St. Mark's EUB Church
 here, scene of the conference, was
 created.
