Poultry Will Require Water for Winter

Farmers have tried various ways of preventing water from freezing in their poultry houses in cold weather. Some simply drain the poultry line and go back to carrying water during the winter. Others, who dislike carrying water even more in the winter than they do in the summer, appear to have devised satisfactory ways of keeping their pressure water systems working no matter what the thermometer reads.

The result of one farmer's idea is shown in the accompanying illustration. It presents one of 16 waterers fashioned from drain tiles, 2 1/2 feet high and 12 inches in diameter. Pie plates, suspended a few inches below the top of the tiles, are used for drinking purposes and water flows into them on a continuous



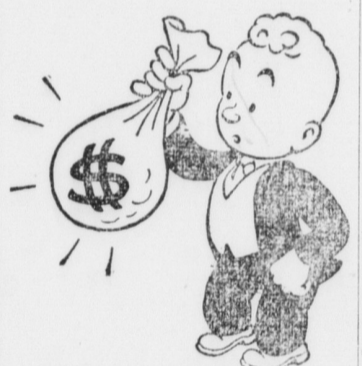
Ideal water heater for winter use can be installed at little cost.

year-round basis. Ordinary sink drains, located below the plates, direct the overflow into a central waste system which serves the three-story poultry house.

Waste water spills over a hill a short distance from the building. The steady flow of water through the supply pipes, plus the fact that all such pipes are doubly protected by being located within conventional soil tiles, keeps them open all winter. To date, ice and snow have not retarded the waste outlet. The system's 500-gallon supply tank is served by a two-horsepower electric motor.

Pays to Mechanize

The mechanical age is paying dividends on the farm as well as in industry, says the Farmers and Manufacturers Beet Sugar Association. A century ago 64 man-hours of labor were required to produce an acre of wheat, now less than



10 hours are needed. One hundred fifty years ago the labor of 19 farm workers was necessary to produce the food consumed by one person living in the city, now one worker can produce for four people living in the cities.

Herds and Flocks

Milk slump usually is caused by fly trouble, poor pasture or both. To control flies, keep buildings sprayed with DDT and use a repellent type of spray at milking time. To bolster short pastures, feed grain or silage.

Mudholes for hogs, aside from harboring parasites and disease, are likely to cause animals to overheat. An animal plastered with mud baked on by the sun, is likely to heat up in a hurry.

Many hogs usually bring 50 cents to \$1 less per 100 pounds when sent to market. It's easy to clean up manure with benzene hexachloride.

Farm Population Drops 10 Per Cent Since 1940

Farm population of the United States declined about three million persons, or 10 per cent, between the census of 1940 and the special estimate as of January 1, 1948. The latest farm population figure of 27,439,000, however, is more than two million larger than the total for January, 1945, when many farm residents were in the armed forces or working in war plants, census reports show.

Penna. Sixth In Meat Production

While United States slaughter of livestock continued a downward trend during the first five months of this year compared with the same period in 1947, Pennsylvania slaughter of all meat animals except hogs showed an increase, the State Department of Agriculture reported today.

With approximately 1,800 commercial establishments licensed by the State, Pennsylvania ranks sixth among all states in slaughter of cattle.

During the month of May, Pennsylvania slaughter of beef cattle and veal calves showed declines of 1,920 and 2,600 head respectively from May 1947. Sheep and lamb numbers were unchanged, but hogs advanced 2,800 head. The five-month Pennsylvania total poundage for all species this year was 622,300,000 pounds, a drop of 10,000,000 from the same period last year according to Federal-State surveys.

Slaughter of beef cattle for this January-May period was 315,000 head, a gain of 19,000 over 1947. Calves at 285,000 head showed an increase of 56,000; sheep and lambs at 115,000 represented a gain of 15,000 head, but hog numbers at 1,137,000 were down 121,000 head.

LYONS' COWS COMPLETED OFFICIAL PRODUCTION TESTS

Several registered Holstein-Friesian cows in the dairy herd owned by Clarence E. Lyons, Mt. Joy, have recently completed official production tests in Herd Improvement Registry Test, The Holstein-Friesian Association of American announces.

The highest producer was Paulidge Supreme Pontiac with a total of 622 pounds of butter fat and 5,232 pounds of milk. The test was completed in 335 days on 3 milkings daily and at the age of 4 years 8 months.

Testing was supervised by Pennsylvania State College, in cooperation with The Holstein - Friesian Association of America.

STORE GARDEN CROPS

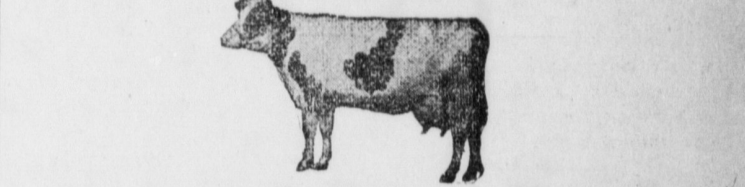

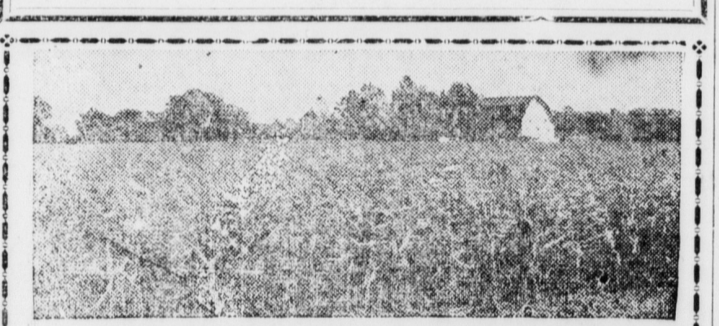
