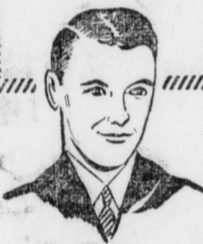
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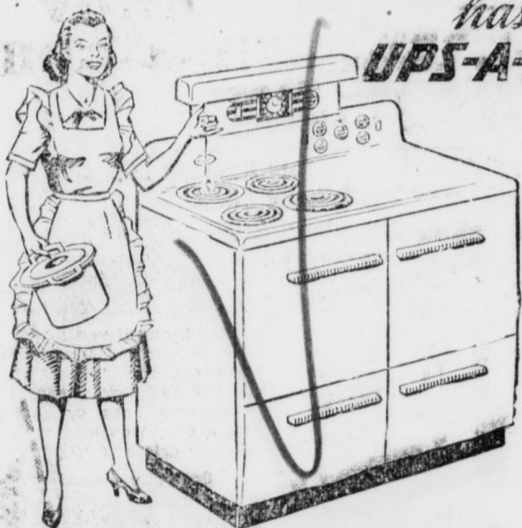

Firemen Will Get 500-gal. Pumper

Fire Chief Paul Shiffer, of the Elizabethtown Friendship Company, said the fire started about 7 a.m. Fireman of the company, who arrived on the scene 15 minutes after the blaze started, found the top sections of both buildings a mass of flames.

The Rheems Fire Company, which arrived at the scene first, reported that the fire was under control at 8:30, but firemen were still watering down the smoldering wreckage three and one-half hours after the blaze started.

Firemen reported the burning asphalt sent dark clouds of black smoke, which could be seen miles away.

The roofs of both structures, were completely destroyed and sections of the walls caved in. An estimated three-fourths of the installation will have to be rebuilt.

Shiffer said that the asphalt had been recently mixed for a road topping job. In addition to damage to the buildings, equipment worth thousands of dollars was destroyed. Six large electric motors, three conveyors, two screens and many other pieces of shop equipment were lost.

The men had just turned on the electrical equipment at 7 a. m. when the blaze was reported. It spread so rapidly that they didn't have a chance to put it out.

The Heisey Bros. quarry is located on the north side of the Pennsylvania main line, directly opposite Rheems.

and months ago the case was heard and argued.
Last Friday the Dauphin County Court ruled that a Burgess cannot serve as a member of a Municipal Authority in his borough.

Judge Karl E. Richards handed down the ruling in dismissing the appeal of the Borough of Mount Joy from a decision of the Pennsylvania State Department.

The Department previously had refused approval of articles of incorporation of the Mt. Joy Borough Authority.

Judge Richards pointed out in his opinion that a Burgess may have the balance of power in a Council meeting and his vote may decide an issue. He added that the State Supreme Court already has held that it is against the public policy to appoint a councilman to a Borough Authority.

"We can see no difference in principle between the appointment of a councilman and a Burgess," he said.

Quite some weeks ago Burgess Brown resigned as a member of Boro Authority but up to this time his resignation was not accepted by Council.

Firemen Will Get 500-gal. Pumper

On Monday evening volunteer firemen of Friendship Fire Company, were overjoyed at the action of the borough council in awarding a voting acceptance of a proposal of the American LaFrance Foamite Corporation of Elmira, New York. This culminated long effort on the part of Friendship Fire Company after a thorough investigation of the entire field of motor apparatus with numerous visits by members of the committee to outlying communities where they had the opportunity to see demonstrations and other modern equipment of similar design in actual operation.

The council proposes to purchase the latest in design 500 G.P.M. cab-ahead-of-engine American LaFrance 700 series triple combination fire engine.

The fire engine will be equipped with 12 cylinder, 190 Horse Power engine, will be of the enclosed type cab of five-man capacity carrying additional water booster equipment of 300 gallons with the latest design rear bucket fill.

The extra weight calls for oversized tires and it is equipped with a special 35 ft. extension ladder together with three - 10 ft. lengths of 4" hard suction hose, 5" and 4" adapters are provided with suitable mountings. Special coat and boot racks are also provided. Booster hose with nozzle is provided with capacity in hose body of 1500 ft. of 2 1/2" double jacket fire hose.

It is indeed a piece of equipment the committee can well be proud of.

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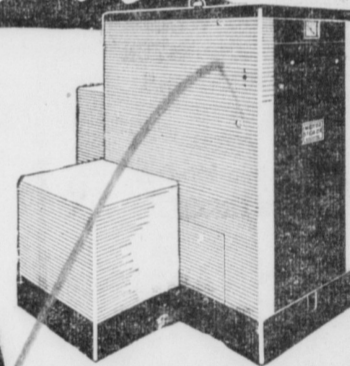
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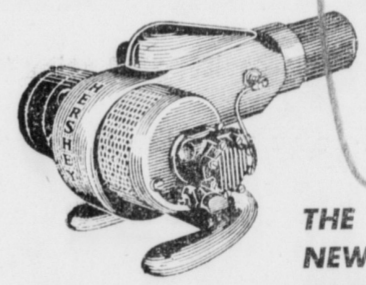
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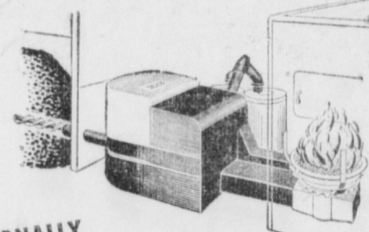
