Black pulled out and passed his auto, but apparently lost control and swerved from the south to the north side of the highway and crashed into a tree. The impact caused the car to rebound across the road, where it was struck head-on by Alexander's car. Both Alexander and Miss Sanford escaped injury.

Pvt. Golden said that Irvin Eugene Ney, 17, Maytown, who was driving in the opposite direction, corroborated Mr. Alexander and Ney told police he saw four headlights approaching as the two cars were abreast, then suddenly saw the one car swerve to the right, hit a tree and rebound back onto the road into the path of Alexander's car.

Dr. Russell Stoner and Dr. Michael Gratch both of Marietta were summoned and pronounced Black and Bates dead of fractured skulls and internal injuries. The bodies were released later by Dr. Hoffman Garber, deputy coroner, E-town, who issued verdicts of accidental death.
