LEGION TEAM OPENS SEASON AT HOME WITH COLUMBIA NOV. 15TH

The Mount Joy Legion Basketball team of the Lancaster County League will open its season with Columbia on Monday, November 15, 1948 on the High School court here. The first game is scheduled to begin at 7:00 p. m. with the varsity attraction following at about 8:15 p. m. The league is composed of twelve teams this year and only the top four in the final standings will be eligible for the play offs. These teams are supposed to be the best in the county and many thrilling games should be encountered, as each team plays a rough twenty-two game schedule.

The Mount Joy team will have a change in personnel this year, and Lee Ellis will again be back as coach, with Hank Hallgren listed as manager. After four practice sessions the varsity is being built around Gene Crider, Harold Fellenbaum, Bill Conrad, Burton Shupp, Hank Hallgren, George Weber, John Crider and Jack Breneman of town; Paul Sload and Skip Libhart of Marietta; and Don Haverstick, Herb Snyder, Jim Snavely and Jay Risser of Landisville.

The "B" team is also in the County League and will be composed of Robert Conner, Art Schneider, Bob Germer, Marlin Frey, Sox Myers, Russ Sumpman Jr., Dave Morris and Don Ober plus some of the varsity players.

Last year the Mount Joy team ended the season in sixth place, in the league, and came in third in the Lancaster Junior Chamber of Commerce Tourney. It is hoped that the new members will give the team the added punch to enable the locals to gain a playoff spot.

On Thursday, November 18, 1948 the team travels to Millersville.

Week's Best Recipe

Creole French Dressing: 1 garlic clove, 1 t salt, 1 t sugar, 1 t celery salt, 1 t paprika, 1 t prepared mustard, 1 t Worcestershire sauce, 1 c tarragon wine vinegar, 1 c salad oil. Cut garlic clove in 2-3 pieces and put in wide-mouthed 1 1/2 or 2 pint jar. Add salt, sugar, celery salt, paprika, mustard, Worcestershire sauce, pepper, tabasco and vinegar. Stir well so seasonings dissolve. Add oil, cover tightly, shake extremely well before using. Refrigerate. Remove garlic before serving.

Save Wood-Ashes

Those who burn wood, are wise to save every bit of the ashes for fertilizer. Wood ashes contain a large amount of potash and, except that they lack nitrogen, they furnish a complete fertilizer. Lime in the ashes, sweetens soil. It isn't advisable to mix wood ashes with strong manures, however. If you don't think you have something valuable in wood ashes, price it, by the ton, as fertilizer, and you will be convinced.

A Fall Treat

For a party, buy two dozen doughnuts and make an orange-tinted frosting for them. Cream together, 3 T butter, 2 c powdered sugar, orange vegetable coloring as desired.

STORE SWEET POTATOES
