Christmas Seal Sale Opens In County Next Week

The 42nd annual Christmas seals sale will open in Lancaster city and county during Thanksgiving Week when letters containing the sheets of the seals are received through the mails by 50,000 local residents.

Goal in the drive is \$45,500. The funds will be used by the T. B. Society of Lancaster County in the work of prevention and control of tuberculosis in this area.

The society's program for the coming year has the following goals. Locate every case of tuberculosis in the city and county by means of the mass chest x-ray surveys.

Isolate every victim of tuberculosis in order to stop the dangerous spread of the disease. Rehabilitate the "cured patients" and the afflicted and his family. Educate the public that tuberculosis is a catching disease.

The Christmas Seal Sale is the only fund-raising campaign made by the Society during the year and the work is not included in any other local social agency program.
