Soil 'Bank Account' Determines Returns

Check up on your soil fertility "bank account." It's more important to you than the number of dollars you have in your commercial account.
Your present and future prosperity depends on your soil's crop producing ability. Crop producing ability, in turn, depends on the size of your soil fertility bank account—how you match deposits and withdrawals.
Every crop you sell carries with it nitrogen, phosphate, potash and



other plant nutrients. Unless you balance these withdrawals with good management "deposits" that replace nutrients, rebuild organic matter and repair damaged soil structure, your soil bank account will be overdrawn.
Among steps recommended for keeping your soil bank solvent are: Use deep-rooted legumes regularly in the rotation. Apply lime on the basis of soil tests. Use commercial fertilizer containing phosphate and potash as needed. Return manure, corn stalks, straw and other crop aftermath to the soil. Use contour cultivation and other conservation methods where necessary.
Just as you will get a notice if your checking account is overdrawn, lower per acre yield and higher per bushel costs will notify you if your soil bank account is being overdrawn.

Farm Bulldozer Blade

This bulldozer blade can be attached or removed from a tractor in three minutes. The blade was salvaged from an old road scraper and the pushers are old 1 1/2 inch galvanized irrigation pipe. The U-clips which attach the pushers to the tractor are 1 1/4 or 1/2 inch flat iron which was bent into shape and welded to the pusher pipes. Braces for the frame are 1 1/4 inch pipe.

Hampshire Sow Sets New Production Mark

Ringold Lady Dora, 753,056, with the litter with which she established a new production record for the Hampshire breed. This sow is the first to have made a "Six Star" record in the Hampshire registry. She is five years old and has raised 75 pigs in eight litters. In her six star litters she has raised 62 pigs, an average of 10.3. These pigs weighed a total of 418 pounds, 56 days after farrowing. She is owned by William C. Goodheart Jr., Eaton, Ohio. She was fed corn, oats, alfalfa and pelleted milk by-products prior to farrowing. Her pigs were raised on a ration of seven parts corn and three parts oats with 8 per cent milk by-products added.

Tests Disclose Silage Increases Hay Tonnage

Tests of haymaking methods show that considerably more tonnage of feed will be obtained from a meadow crop when it is put in a silo than can be procured by any other method of storing.
Analysis of field cured and mow cured hay and of grass silage show a larger percentage of protein in grass than in similar forage cured either in the field or in the mow.

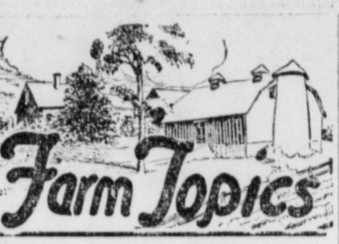

Activities Of Our Local Boy Scouts

A meeting of Troop 39 was held in the scout room with fifteen scouts present. Senior Patrol leader Donald Thome was in charge of the meeting.

A demonstration on how to make track prints in plaster of paris was given by Donald Thome during the instructional period. Mr. Snyder gave a demonstration on knife and axe. Following this talk an interesting instructional game was played. The scouts were supposed to light three matches, which were upright in a board, by carefully swinging an axe at them. The purpose of the game was to teach the boys to use the axe accurately and correctly. This game was won by Patrol leader Gerald Berrier.
The Stag and Hawk patrols went on a short hike, for the purpose of locating and identifying tracks of animals. Members of the Stag patrol found weasel tracks, while the Hawk patrol discovered the tracks of a bulldog. The Stag patrol again came in first.

Herds and Flocks

All night lights help to prevent stampeding of turkeys on range.
Blackhead of turkeys causes heavy losses. Phenothiazine powder mixed in the mash at the rate of one ounce daily for 100 birds, has been found effective in preventing losses, because it destroys fecal worms which are carriers of the blackhead organisms.
To make lambs tick proof, spray them with DDT. Mix one pound of a 50 per cent wettable DDT powder in 25 gallons of water and apply it to the back, belly, sides and around neck and ears. One application should last for two or three weeks.
Two essentials for livestock and poultry in late summer are shade and water.
DDT Proves Effective On Peach Tree Borer
DDT, when used as a trunk spray, will control the peach tree borer, according to the New York State agricultural experiment station. The new method of borer control takes the place of older methods using ethylene dichloride of PDB crystals, since it is non-injurious, labor-saving, time-saving and inexpensive. DDT is used at the rate of two pounds to each 100 gallons of water.

Crop Roots Require Oxygen and Water

Soils must "breathe" deeply if crop roots are to support high yields above the ground. These roots need oxygen to grow and reach out for water plant nutrients.
To breathe deeply, soils must have regular additions of organic matter. Without organic matter soils tighten up. Soil particles are jammed together. The soil becomes a compacted mass. There is little room for either air or water. Roots find it hard to forage in the tight soil.
When organic matter is added, it opens the soil for air and water to soak in deeply. As it rots the organic matter builds soil structure. The humus formed from organic matter swells and shrinks with wetting and drying. Compounds that form when organic matter decays help to stick these mineral particles together in small groups so that the soil is loose and workable.
Organic matter should be added deep in the soil as well as in the plow layer. Middle West Soil Improvement committee points out that the best way to drive organic matter down deep is through use of tap-rooted legumes, such as alfalfa or sweet clover, regularly in the rotation. The roots of these legumes drill down 15 to 25 inches below the plow layer.
Heavy stands of legumes also can be secured by liming according to soil tests, and by making sure soils are well stocked with phosphate and potash for full production. When a good top growth is plowed under to go with the roots, these legumes will build the structure till soil needs for high yields.
