Timely Advice To Poultry Raisers

If farmers want to save time and labor on chicken chores, here are 12 ways suggested by a group of farm experts who have been studying better methods of poultry raising:

- Have large pens (250 hens plus). Have a year-round automatic water supply, with a disposal system for slop and rinse water.
- Have the feed supply accessible inside the pens, by chute or bins.
- Have a nesting room, or nest sections back to back, near where the caretaker enters the pen.
- Arrange the mash feeders end-to-end in line.
- Combine jobs on each trip through the house.
- Have an elevator or conveyor in large houses with more than one story.
- Keep all hens in one building.
- Reduce the number of times the jobs are done.
- Have carriers in large poultry houses.
- Have the egg room near the hens.
- Provide a handy method of cleaning the house.
- Each of these suggestions is explained and illustrated in a 2,500 word report titled, "Less Time For Chicken Chores", which appears in the January issue of Country Gentleman. Harold E. Botsford and Louis M. Hurd, Cornell University professors of husbandry, and Ivan R. Bierly, Edward H. Pipers and Wendell Earle, field investigators, are credited with making the poultry study.



Selection of Feeds Vital in Stock Health

Ration Must Be Adequate In Minerals, Vitamins.

What you feed your livestock today will determine the profit you make tomorrow, for experts are agreed that keeping livestock healthy is a profitable job—and to do that, care must be observed in choosing livestock feed.

Feeding livestock on a ration deficient in minerals, vitamins, proteins and carbohydrates, as well as fats, often leads to nutritional diseases. Lack of any of the common or trace minerals in home grown feeds may be and often is, responsible for terrific livestock, feed, labor and investment losses.

The problem of supplying minerals in their right proportions is only a part of the compounding of a product that will solve the livestock man's problems. First, no matter how good the ingredients that go into the making up of a feed, if livestock refuse to eat it the feed is useless so far as benefiting the animal is concerned.

In recent years much has been discovered about livestock diseases due to dietary influences. In this connection, the U. S. department of agriculture says: "Whenever a vital function . . . is interrupted owing to continued failure of the diet to supply sufficient quantities of essential nutrients, or to the inability of the body to utilize these nutrients, the so-called nutritional diseases develop."

Live Stock Runs Risk Of Deficiency Disease

Even with abundant supplies of grain and hay this winter, farm livestock still run the risk of deficiency disease caused by lack of certain vitamins and minerals.

No matter how heavily they are fed farm animals in winter quarters may actually be starving for elements provided by sunshine and green grass during the summer.

Where symptoms of vitamin shortage appear, a veterinarian can give an emergency treatment and permanent correction can then be effected by fortifying the rations with the proper supplements.

Deficiency of Vitamin A is the most common trouble. Results may include eye troubles, swollen legs, stillbirths in swine, and of pneumonia in newborn calves and pigs. Another frequent sign of this deficiency is nutritional roup in poultry flocks.

Sunless weather, depriving animals of sufficient Vitamin D, may cause rickets in young stock. Crooked bones, enlarged joints, fits and convulsions are often symptoms of this deficiency.

Earthy minerals also may be lacking in winter feed, curtailing milk production or causing lameness in dairy and beef cows.

Immediate diagnosis of any apparent deficiency case was urged, to determine whether inadequate rations or some infectious disease is the actual cause of trouble.

'Love Apple' Popular

The scarcity of tomatoes in the past year's otherwise abundant harvests recalls something of the history of this romantic fruit-vegetable. A sharp drop in production in some of the nation's principal tomato-growing areas means smaller domestic stocks of tomato soup, juices, stews, ketchup and chili sauce this winter. Unseasonable weather is given as the cause.

One hundred years ago the tomato was just beginning an uphill fight for respectability as a food item. Indians of the Andes had cultivated it since about 1000 A. D. The Aztecs of Mexico gave it the name that Cortez' men altered into "tomato"—and they probably said "toh-mah-toe." And the Spaniards took it back to Europe, but there it was recognized as a member of the deadly nightshade family.



It was wrinkled and small and was known as the "love apple" in Europe and, later, in North America. And for centuries the supposedly poisonous fruit was nothing more than a garden ornament.

Paper Lining Doubles Effect of Light Shades

Lights around the house often seem dim at the time of year when evenings are longer. But light from lamps often can be increased by arranging for simple and better reflection. Light colors reflect light, dark colors absorb it. A white paper lining or a coat of white paint—or even white shoe polish on the inside of a lamp shade may double or triple the light given off.
