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SOLVE CHICK PROBLEMS
Cold weather chicks avoid disease dangers common later on, distribute labor in brooding, and make better use of equipment, reports F. H. Leuschner, extension poultry specialist of the Pa. State College. As grown pullets they come into production when egg prices usually are most favorable for producers.

LOAMY SOIL BEST
To give young vegetable seedlings a good start, sow seed in hotbeds and coldframes with well-drained soil, advises James O. Dutt, extension vegetable specialist of the Pa. State College. The plants do not thrive well in early spring in ground naturally wet. Roots of plants started under the glass need little water.

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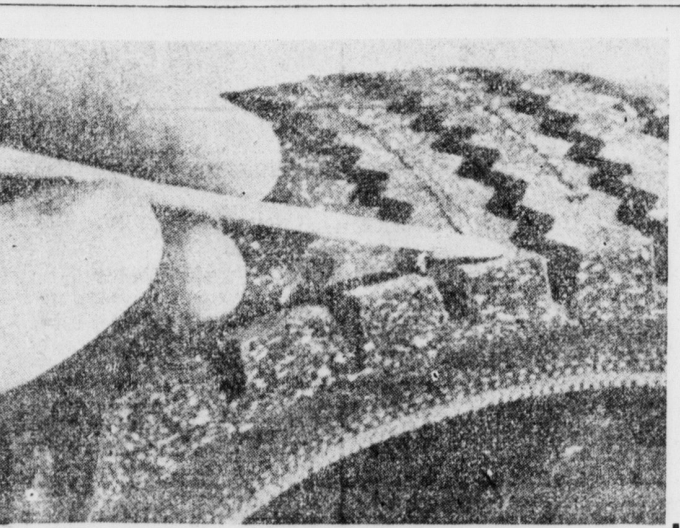
