Miss Jane Wilson, of Clairton, Pa., and a graduate of Grove City College has been employed to teach Spanish and English. Formerly, she taught in Allegheny County. These new instructors succeed Mrs. Frances Duffy, Mrs. Nancy Chamberlain and Miss Lydia Wagner. We were unable to secure an art supervisor, to succeed Miss Clara Byers but we hope to be able to provide art instruction again next year. Mr. Samuel F. Simmons, our vocational agriculture supervisor since 1938 has also resigned to accept another position. In his place, we have secured the services of Mr. Gene Miller Love, of Penn State College.

To improve our student services, we have employed as a consultant Mr. Edward Jordan, now attending Columbia University. Mr. Jordan will endeavor to organize and plan our facilities in this growing and important field. Mr. Jordan is on leave of absence from the Schenectady, New York, schools. We are also pleased to have secured the services of the personnel of the Franklin and Marshall College Guidance Center to test, interview and counsel our senior students concerning their abilities and aptitudes and to give them every aid possible in job placement and in college entrance. This work is under the direction of Mr. S. F. Munson and Mrs. Dorothy LeFever. This service is so important, we feel that it should be expanded next year to include all students possible.

Another new feature of our program this year is to require each junior and each senior student to take public speaking. The ability to speak publicly in small groups and in large gatherings is ever important. We hope that you will wholeheartedly approve of this requirement.

In our elementary schools, we have secured the services of a penmanship supervisor. We use

the Peterson System of Handwriting, a system well known in the western part of Pennsylvania. It was used in Mt. Joy Borough Schools last year and they are well pleased with the results.

Our school enrollment has increased this year both in the lower grades and in the high school. Our beginners will increase again next year, so we have an immediate problem of adding more elementary teachers next year. We shall also have to provide additional classrooms. The increase in high school enrollment is due to the fact that we are getting more non-resident students. These students are being transported by the districts sending them at no expense to us. The sending districts pay their tuition costs—a considerable amount of revenue (\$8500) is received from this source and we feel no detriment accrues to our instruction or efficiency for no additional sections or teachers are necessary to instruct them. They do add to the size of the classes but not to a degree that will impair the instruction offered. Our high school enrollment is now as follows:

Grade 7, 65; Grade 8, 75; Grade 9, 85; Grade 10, 49; Grade 11, 61; Grade 12, 46. This is a total enrollment in grades nine through twelve. We expect this number to increase to 400 next year.

It is in the high school that we need more teaching space. As you know, our home economics and vocational agricultural shop is now conducted in rented space, a distance from the present high school general shop is small and our cafeteria area is far from adequate. We have considered this problem for a long time and we feel that our best interests can be served only by building a vocational building on the present school grounds to house our general shop, our vocational agricultural department, our home economics group and our cafeteria. This would bring all instruction back to our present site, and would, in addition, provide four more classrooms in the present high school building. These preliminary plans have been approved by the county board of education, which must now pass on all building programs. When the plans are more complete, another newsletter will explain them in more detail. The additional classroom space should also solve our elementary needs for the immediate future, since a room or two will be available in our high school building for elementary purposes.

It is with deep regret that we record the accidental and untimely death in our present high school building, Mr. M. R. Hoffman, Jr., Mr. George E. Morris, of Maytown, appointed to fill Mr. Hoffman's unexpired term. He will serve until the fall election in 1949.

We note, with satisfaction, the remark of a prominent farm owner in our township, that "my farms are more valuable because we have good schools here". We hope all of you feel that way too.

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# Farm Bureau Co-op Will Hold a Meeting on Wednesday Feb'y 9

The 24th annual meeting of the Lanc. Co. Farm Bureau Co-op. Assoc. will be held Wednesday, February 9th, at 10:00 a. m. in the Mt. Joy High School auditorium.

The total number of stockholders in Lancaster County now exceeds 4000. The meeting will be open to anyone who cares to attend. The agenda consists of group singing, reports of the past year's activities, a short talk by our retiring County Agent, Floyd Bucher, and election of four directors, each to serve a three year term. A free lunch will be served at noon.

According to a provision in the By-Laws, no Director may serve more than three successive terms each. J. Homer Graybill, Mannheim RD1 and James T. Hastings, Kirkwood, having completed three full terms, will retire from the Board at this meeting.

In the afternoon session the Rural Youth of Lancaster Co. will provide special entertainment.

The main speaker of the day will be Mr. Howard Latshaw, Director of Pa. Farm Bureau Dept. of organization. Mr. Latshaw has been engaged in Cooperative organizational work in the Western part of Penna. for a number of years, has a full understanding of farmers' problems, and has the ability to give an interesting and worthwhile address.

I think it is the duty of everybody to help in a campaign such as this to build a new hospital for the benefit of all. If my few words will lend assistance to the appeal, I shall consider myself very fortunate. It is thrilling to be asked to participate, even in a small way."

Diane, a pretty brunette, is the daughter of the late John Barrymore, the actor noted for his profile and portrayal of Shakespearean roles. Just before his death, he made several movies. Her mother is the well known Michael Strange, poetess and lecturer, who was the first to instigate the "look-alike" fashions so popular today, wherein the boy and girl dress in as similar a fashion as possible. Diane's uncle is Lionel, who may be heard on the air as "Mayor of Our Town" and in the movies as Doctor Gillespie, hard-boiled but soft-hearted physician. Her equally famous aunt is Ethel Barrymore, also of the stage and screen.

Appearing with such stars as Jon Hall and Robert Cummings, Miss Barrymore has made more than 20 movies. During the war she spent many months in the battle areas overseas, entertaining our troops and made a few films in England.

Miss Barrymore, who impressed the New York critics with her dramatization of the star role in "Rebecca" is now reading script for an as yet untitled play which will go into production sometime in the fall.

Her address in Lancaster will be the Hotel Brunswick.
