George McCue, of Town, Clinches Co. Scoring Title

Every once in so often, athletes throughout the county must bow to the young men from Mount Joy. Our own Eugene Crider made many tennis players look like chumps; Marshall Gemberling is making the pros sit up and take notice as a member of Lancaster's Rockets, and in addition made many batters look like contortionists while trying to connect with his slants while doing mound duty for Lebanon Valley College and some semi-pro teams; Harold Fellenbaum, who won the County League tennis championship; and Frank and Bobby Zink winners of the city and county men's doubles tennis championship.

Now along comes George McCue to win almost every individual honor in the County High School Basketball League, the "rookie of the year", the Mt. Joy High School had the scoring championship of the 1948-49 season tucked securely in his pocket with 16 points to spare.

A sophomore, who never played jay-vee ball because he was a member of Mt. Joy Junior High School's undefeated championship team last year, young George sharp-shot his way past older and more experienced players, most of whom played a longer schedule, to clinch the title with 196 points in 10 Section 1 games.

McCue's nearest competitor for honors is Ira "Bonnie" Shaeffer, a West Lampeter senior, who wound up his scholastic career this week with a 25-point rally to give him a total of 180 points in 12 section 2 games.

McCue, an all-round athlete, in addition to being the highest scorer, sported the best average of any player with 19.6 points per game. His 78 field goals were the tops for the circuit and the 13 field goals and 32 points which he scored against Manheim Boro are both high individual game marks. The Mt. Joy Ace, with two more years in which to improve his own records, scored better than 20 points in six of his 10 league games.

We predict a very bright future for this popular young athlete during his "two more years to go."

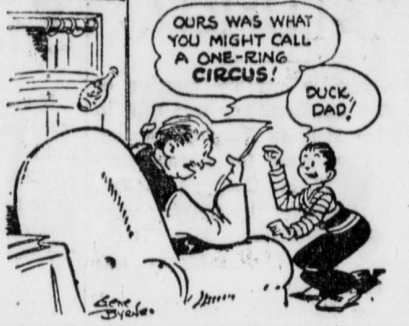
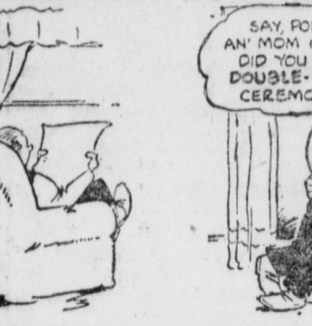
Village of Maytown

took a survey and found approximately 130 families out of 175 in the community were willing to use the public water system. Then it hired the Capitol Engineering Corp. of Dillsburg to draw up technical plans. Those plans are now ready, reported chairman Hiestand.

The latest concrete development has been the purchase of a water source, a spring one mile northwest of Maytown, on the property of Irwin B. Glatfelter, just off the Maytown - to Elizabethtown road.

The water system, reported Rev. Hiestand, would also include a pumping station at the source, a 100,000 gallon water tank and about two miles of water main. Cost to the individual consumer has not been determined definitely.
