county who rely on the General for modern hospital care will generously cooperate with Mr. Snavely in meeting the needs of their General in 1949.

The bulk of the 1948 campaign goal will be used to subsidize the General's charity work which will amount to approximately \$147,000 by the end of the current fiscal year. Hospital authorities pointed out that toward this total the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has appropriated only \$54,000, now

leaving a substantial obligation to be met by the local community.

In addition to meeting the current fiscal year deficit for the current fiscal year, the 1949 campaign goal of \$94,968 will provide \$35,000 for replacement of major items of the equipment. During the twelve months ending December 31, 1948, the General admitted 11,284 patients. This was 1500 more than admitted in the comparable period two short years before. In spite of this peak load of work the daily waiting list of would-be patients still averages 200.

This tremendous record of the service has imposed heavy burdens on hospital facilities and equipment. In order to continue operating efficiently at such emergency levels, major items of equipment have had to be replaced and additional facilities must be purchased and placed in operation. It is for these two purposes -- charity work and replacement funds -- that the forthcoming campaign is to provide funds.

Additional campaign leaders appointed by Mr. Snavely are: John S. Wise, City Chairman; Richard Oblander, Special Gifts Chairman; Lowell Halligan, Chairman of the Promotion Committee.
