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EDITORIAL

Even though they hurried the father of Daylight Saving Time last week, we presume, out of respect, folks will observe his suggestion for another year, at least.

This cockeyed 1-hour saving the time was a good war time issue and no-one would object to it today if it were universal, but here you make an hour, there you lose an hour. That's the case through the United States and the sooner we establish fast or slow time as a standard, the better it will be for all.

A nation-wide survey indicates at least one-third of the nation's 145,000,000 citizens will live under the new time for the late Spring and Summer. The greatest supporters are golfers, gardeners and commuters and others who love outdoors.

THE ATLANTIC PACT

We hear, read and talk of the North Atlantic Pact and yet some are not too familiar with its real meaning. Diplomatic words are sometimes confusing to us. Boiled down, the preamble of the Pact is comprehensive. It says: "The parties to this treaty are determined to safeguard the freedom common heritage, and civilization of their peoples..." It contains about 1,000 words contained in 11 articles. Twelve nations have signed, promising allied intervention to resist attack. The North Atlantic Pact includes Britain, France, Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg, United States, Canada, Norway, Denmark, Iceland, Italy, and Portugal. Total area of regions covered by the defense alliance is about 2,000,000 square miles and the population about 190,000,000. Soviet Russia and satellites cover about 8,200,000 square miles and a population of 295,004,000.

GO TO SUNDAY SCHOOL

It has become very popular talk about the importance of saving our American way of life. As a matter of fact, the only way we can lose it is for the American people themselves to become negligent in exercising the rights and privileges they have under our form of government that the liberties they are granted will go by default.
