That means just one thing, rat control is a continuous job. Special campaigns for the control of rats are entirely ineffective unless they are followed by a year-around program of rat killing and protection against them. The most effective way to prevent rat damage is to keep the rats away from the food. If you can do this you will discourage the rats and they will leave the premises. But you cannot depend on any one measure to control rats on your farm. Poisoning, which you may have done last fall, removing rat harbors, rat-proofing buildings, trapping rats and if necessary fumigating the rat burrows all help. Rats prefer hiding places convenient to food supplies. These are common in old buildings or of newly erected structures that are not built to exclude rats. Outside of buildings they gather in rock piles, wood piles, piles of all discarded lumber or other containers, and similar piles of waste material. If you have tried poisoning, you may have missed a few, or rats may move in from the neighbors dumps etc. So go a couple of steps further. Clean up all places where rats could hide around your buildings, then begin to rat proof such buildings as the corn cribs, granaries, feed bins, or any other place where feed or the food is kept.

AVOID BULL HAZARD
One way of eliminating the hazard of having a dairy herd bull (they are never safe) on the farm, suggests Joe S. Taylor, extension dairy specialist of Pa. State College, is the use of artificial breeding, a program which now takes in one-fifth of all dairy cows and also heifer of breeding age in the State. Incidentally, dairy artificial breeding is now available in all counties and in all communities with a concentration of all the dairy animals.

GIVE PULLETS ROOM
Pullets reared in confinement need plenty of room and good ventilation, reminds Carl D. Dossin the extension poultry specialist, of the Penna. State College. Put rearing them on range, where pastures are available, is the cheaper practice if no unusual problems, such as predators and storm, are involved.

GET SPRAY SCHEDULE
Control of insects and plant diseases, a major part of the farm program, is explained in detail in schedules worked out by extension entomologists and the plant pathologists of Pa. State College. Copies of these recommendations are available for the asking at the Agricultural Extension offices in all counties of the State.

PREVENTING EROSION
Counter trip demonstrations for preventing soil erosion will reach a new high total this spring, reports Frank G. Bamer, extension agronomist of the Pa. State College. By the end of 1948 these layouts had been established with the aid of the Agricultural Extension Service on 5456 farms.

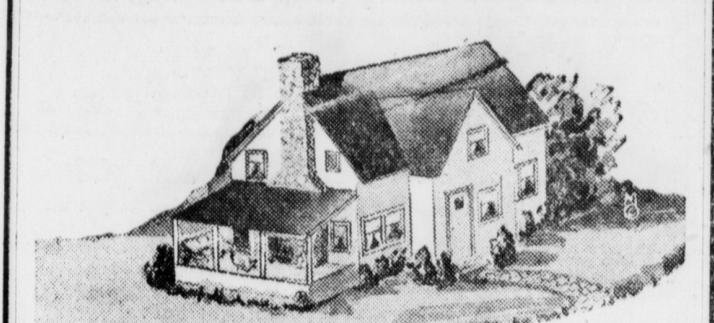

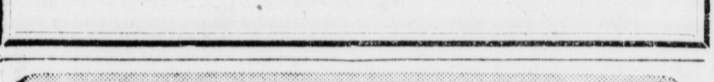
