The West Hempfield Twp. School District will receive sealed bids for a 60-passenger school bus. Bids will be opened at the July 11 meeting of the board.

Nathaniel E. Snyder, secretary of the board, reported that four schools in the township will be closed and pupils transported to Mountville. The four schools are Fairview, Sterlie, Kehler and Airy Vale.

Reason for closing, Snyder said, is that attendance, at some of these one-room schools has dropped and the board feels it would be more economical to transport the pupils to Mountville. The schools will probably be sold at a public auction at some later date, he reported.

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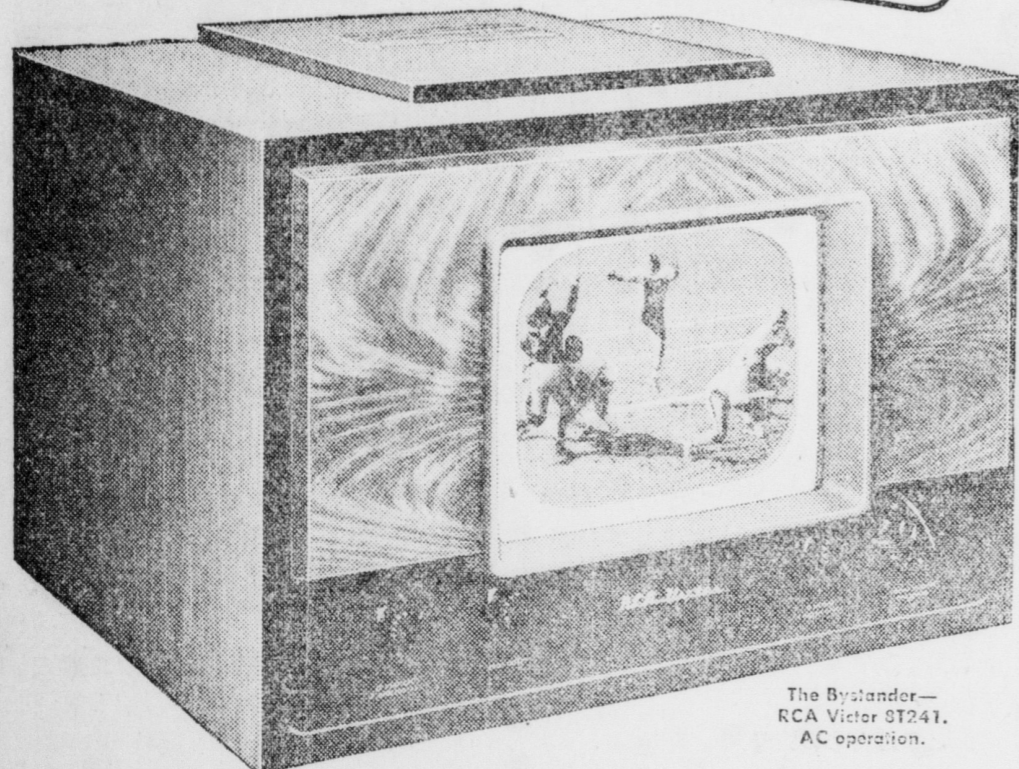
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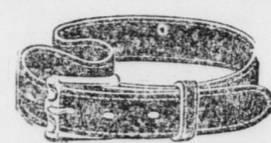
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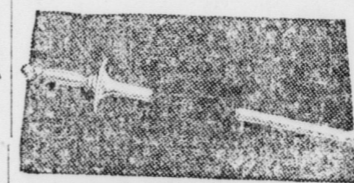
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
