tersection of the old road branching off to Salunga, plus a spacious fill and a spit in the four-laner with a wide grass plot in the center, will require considerable work. About one-fourth mile east is another big fill and the intersection of a second road from the North leading to Chickies. At this point many important changes have been made. The large quarry hole has been filled in and when completed this entire section will present an entirely different and improved appearance. There is still considerable work to be done at this point.
When completed the new highway will shorten the distance between Mount Joy and Lancaster approximately two miles. Today it is twelve miles, a few months hence it will be ten.
While there will be a big relief in traffic between here and Lancaster, when the new road is completed, it must be remembered that our Main Street will continue to accommodate all the traffic of both roads.

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
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
