PRICE INSURANCE

Chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture, Representative Harold Cooley of N. C., has suggestions for price insurance for the farm market price but Cooley says an insurance set-up is better than a flat government subsidy. Crop insurance against weather risks is no new story but this would be insurance against price loss. Week's Best Recipe

Jellied Ham Loaf: 1 c cooked smoked ham, 1-2 c diced celery, 1-4 c diced dill pickles, 1-4 c minced pimento, 1 1-2 T gelatine, 1-4 c cold water, 2 c stock or bouillon, 1-2 c mayonnaise, 1 hard cooked egg. Dice left-over ham fine; combine with celery, pickle and pimento. Soak gelatine five minutes in cold water. Heat stock. Add gelatine and stir until dissolved. Chill. When mixture begins to congeal, add mayonnaise and meat mixture. Put sliced hard cooked eggs in bottom of an eight inch ring mold or loaf pan. Four in meat mixture and chill until firm. Slice and serve. The yield is 6-8 servings.

Barrel Garden

Tub, keg or barrel gardening is an interesting form of horticultural experimenting. You can grow trailing, flowering plants like the petunias, marigolds, oxalis and small annuals in these barrel gardens. Dewberries, small fruiting tomatoes and strawberries do well in these tubs, especially are the strawberries popular and eye-catching. Place barrel on a sheltered spot, raised from the ground on bricks for about three inches so air can circulate underneath. Bore 15 holes three inches in diameter, staggered around sides and for the drainage bore four small holes in bottom. Grow 15 plants in the sides and three in the top. Soil should be clay type mixed with a plant food, two inches of gravel or coarse sand in bottom. Tamp it down then loosen around holes as you plant. Fill barrel to just below first holes, set in plants, spreading roots well, go on filling to next holes and repeat. Set plants at top of holes to allow for settling.

Make Good Dumplings

Sift 1 cup flour, 2 teaspoons of baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon nutmeg, 2 tablespoons sugar, together. Blend in 3 tablespoons shortening, combine with 1 egg slightly beaten and add 1-4 cup milk. Stir into mixture to form a light dough.


