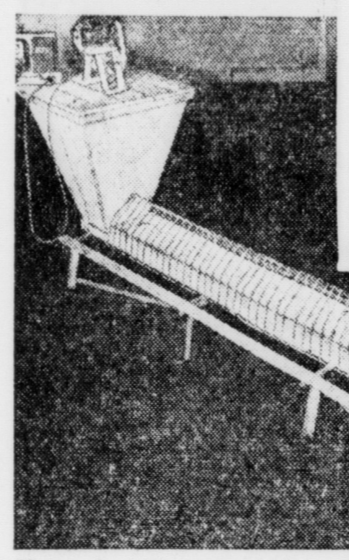

Setting Hen Given Walking Papers As Power Invades Poultry Business

The setting hen is losing her barnyard grip. A few more years and she'll be little more than a legend. Her job, like scores of others in the poultry business, has gone mechanical.

In this movement toward the industrial way of doing things on the farm, electricity has played a major part. It has brought the "push button" age of agriculture to a high degree of accomplishment. It can do just about everything but produce the egg. With that necessary bit of business out of the way, here's how electricity takes over.

It hatches eggs in automatic electric incubators, which provide uniform heat and moisture control. Electric brooding is the next step. And from this point on, any number of electrical helpers move into the poultry picture.

Water is brought to the poultry house by means of a pressure water system. It is done automatically, and without fuss or feathers. Winter weathering problems, too, have been eliminated. Pipes are protected in cold weather by soil heating cable. And water is kept ice-free in drinking fountains and troughs by immersion heaters. Even the feeding job has gone "push button." For automatic mash feeders are available for use with hens and broilers over 3 weeks old. They work in harmony with the farmer's lighting schedule, are operated by 1/4 horsepower motors and controlled by time switches.

Electricity keeps the lights burning 13 out of 24 hours a day during the spring, fall and winter months. That is the magic number of "light hours" required to enable hens to maintain

maximum production in so-called "off seasons."

And then, eggs can be cleaned, graded and candled electrically. Electricity operates poultry house ventilating systems, poultry scalders and waxers. It powers "rubber-fingered" poultry pickers which pick as high as 200 birds an hour. To farmers who complain of cannibalism in their flocks or about the loss of mash billed out and lost from feeding troughs, agricultural science offers the cauterizer. It is used to clip off a small section of the chicken's upper beak or mandible—the cause of such

PREVENT FARM FIRES

Half of all farm fires could be prevented if structural defects in farm buildings were remedied, asserts John R. Haswell, extension agricultural engineer of the Pa. State College. To prevent fires caused by such defects he recommends:

Adequate and properly installed wiring; soundly constructed chimneys; efficient lightning rod systems; fire resistant roofing; efficient heating plants; and fire stops in walls and partitions.

FERTILIZE PEONIES

Peonies and delphiniums need a 3-12-6 commercial fertilizer, says A. O. Rasmussen, extension ornamental horticulturist of the Pa. State College. He reminds gardeners to avoid high nitrogenous fertilizer for these plants. All flowering peony stalks should be cut off unless seed is desired.

School Merger To Go On The Ballot At Fall Election

Voters of Manheim borough and Penn and Rapho Twp. will be asked next November to approve formation of a joint school district.

The required legal step to place the matter on the ballot was taken yesterday when school directors of the three districts formally petitioned the County Commissioners.

The Commissioners must get the okay of the State Department of Public Instruction in Harrisburg but this is regarded as a formality.

Plans for the joint district were announced several months ago. Under the project, all members of the three school boards would continue to serve on a joint board. The enlarged board would administer all affairs of the new district.

Main purpose of the combination would be to ease crowded conditions by possibly providing new school facilities. If approved at the election, the merger would take effect July 1, 1950.
