Farmer Can Enroll In First Pa. Corn Club Until Aug. 1

Farmers in Pennsylvania this year will have the opportunity to enroll in the first Pennsylvania Corn Club which is sponsored by the Pennsylvania Crop Improvement Association and the Extension Service cooperating.

The purpose of this new club is to give recognition to corn growers who produce not less than 75, 100, or 125 bushels of the sound corn per acre depending upon the country in which the farm is located. Lancaster Co. growers will undoubtedly be judged by the 125 bushel standard. This project will serve as a demonstration on proper seed bed preparation, the use of adapted hybrid varieties, the intelligent use of land, manures and of commercial fertilizers, sufficient stands of plants and efficient weed control and cultivation.
