

Farmer Can Enroll

who qualify will be given at the next Farm Show at Harrisburg by the Crop Improvement Assoc.

A few simple rules will govern the contest should be mentioned:

1. A farmer can make one entry only.
2. All contestants must register with their County Agent Office not later than August 1st. This can be done by either calling at the office in the Lancaster Post Office or by calling 2-7977 Lancaster.
3. There shall be no less than 5 acres of one variety or hybrid at one location on the farm. If farm or corn fields are laid out in strips, three may be entered providing the two intervening strips are grown to close growing crops. The total acreage in this case must total at least 5 acres.
4. Yields are to be determined by harvesting a specified number of feet of two adjacent rows of corn in ten different locations. For example, with 40 inch rows, a total of 660 feet of corn must be harvested. The harvesting locations are to be selected by the official or officials designed to do the checking.
5. The grower shall furnish the labor to do the husking, the weighing, and getting the samples for determining moisture. This must all be done while the checker is present.
6. Corn under irrigation will be disqualified.

The important thing to remember now is that applications after August 1st will not be accepted.
