A One Day Open Doe Season This Fall December 10

A one-day season on antlerless deer tops the 1949 hunting menu handed to Pennsylvania nimrods by the State Game Commission.

While only a day in length, the placing of doe and antlerless bucks in the legal quarry category assures hunters plenty of action for their first year under the higher license fee. In 1947, last time the restriction was relaxed, the kill was 60,000 in a single day compared to 30,000 for the 10-day buck season.

Pennsylvania's hunting licenses will cost \$3.15 for resident hunters and \$25 for out-of-state nimrods instead of the previous \$2 and \$15 fees.

The Buck Season this year will run from Nov. 28 to Dec. 9. A need for balancing the herd and reducing its consistent with natural food supply was listed by the Commission as the reason for the special open season.

Only one deer, either antlered or not, is the legal bag limit. Any county may forego the antlerless season by a petition of the majority of its hunters and farmers.

The small game season, as in other years, opens Nov. 1, and ends Nov. 26. This includes rabbits, grey, black and fox squirrels, male ringneck pheasants and wild turkeys.

The bear season opens Nov. 14, and closes Nov. 19.

In order that grouse may continue their comeback, a curtailed season again was declared. The dates are Nov. 1-3 and 10-12.

The turkey season extends from Nov. 1-26 but the season ends on Nov. 12 in Cameron, Clearfield, Clinton, Elk, Jefferson, Lycoming, McKean, Potter, Snyder, Sullivan, Tioga and Union counties.

In addition, part of all 25 counties are closed to turkey hunting. Snowshoe rabbits may be hunted from Dec. 19 to Jan. 2 with racoons in season from Nov. 1 through Feb. 1st.

Hunting will not be allowed on Sundays and shooting on Nov. 1 may not start before 9 a. m. Regular shooting hours are from 7 a. m. to 5 p. m. except from July 1 to Sept. 30 when the hours are from 6 a. m. to 7:30 p. m., Eastern Standard Time.

Gene Crider, of town, defeated Harold Martin 6-3, 6-4.

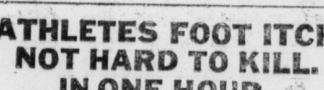
