FARM SAFETY

The week of July 21 is proclaimed as National Farm Safety Week. With what we hear and read of the dangers of 'life in the big city', it seems we are wrong in believing rural living is the safest. It takes Farm Safety Week to remind us that living and working on a farm is almost the most dangerous of anywhere. There are more fatalities in the agricultural activities than in any other major industry. Whether it is a charging bull or a decrepit tractor, there lie hazards to man's well being. The setting aside of this one week is the hope of arousing people of the rural areas to take steps to reduce the farm accident rate.

About 18,000 farm folk are killed each year in farm homes, farm work, automobile accidents on farm roads. Of those accidents not fatal, there was a loss of 17 million working days, last year. The cost, in non-fatal accidents, not including the lost time, figured \$36 million. Automobile accidents, falls from the stepladders and haystacks, unsafe

farm machines, mean animals that bite, kick and charge, add medical cost and loss of work. Three times as many farm men are injured as farm women. These needles, accidents, entailing all the cost in money and lives, now justify a week of education, thru co-operation by organized farm groups, rural press and radio.

WHEN YOU DON'T VOTE

Whether you exercise a right to vote or not is your privilege. The argument against the man who doesn't, is that of duty in conjunction with privilege. Perhaps he hasn't had any issue arise that is of such paramount importance, that concerns him vitally enough to cast his ballot. But we can't understand this attitude when the results of voting an national, state, county and city issues, touches all of us.

But let something arise that is so personal you may be directly affected by its results, and watch the man register! Take, for instance, the much-heated controversial topic of socialized medicine, for example. This affects all doctors in the United States. It is an important question for the profession with a vast majority of doctors throughout the country warning of its danger. In the city of Cincinnati, Ohio a metropolitan area, there are many doctors. If the issue of socialized medicine should be brought to a vote, you would guess that at least 90 to 95 per cent of them would vote against. But, no more than 10 per cent would! You are surprised because you had thought all doctors were against socialized medicine? The reason for less than 10 per cent of Cincinnati doctors so voting, is because less than 10 per cent of the doctors of Cincinnati are registered voters.

What determines the price of gasoline?

The answer probably looks easy—in a free economy the price charged for almost anything is decided by such forces as the cost of materials and labor, competition, and the supply and demand situation. But, in the case of gasoline, there is still another very important factor. Gasoline is just one product resulting from a multi-product manufacturing operation. In other words, to get a given amount of gas, the producer must also make certain amounts of kerosene, heating oil, Diesel fuel, etc.

Here is how that fact influences gasoline prices. Suppose—as was the case last winter—demand for heating fuels is strong and prices are good. Then the producer can make most of his profit from selling them, and he can hold gas prices down. Then suppose, as occasionally occurs, demand for these oils is sluggish, and to move them he must sell below their average cost. In that case, he will probably have to increase the price charged for gasoline in order to keep out of the red. According to one authority, "It is not the operation of the law of supply and demand on one product that moves the price up or down in this multi-product business; it is the operation of the law in relationship to all the products."

In any event, the price of gasoline or any oil product is as low as current conditions permit. And, believe it or not, gasoline takes a substantially smaller part of the consumer's budget now than it did before the war.

It was probably surprising to read of the many bitten by the Tucker bug. As we follow the fantastic procedure dealing in millions of dollars, it occurs to us that there were numerous men of far keener business sense than ourselves, taken in by the deal. But this happens every day in business.

Tax payers are letting government spending pass with as little investigation into its business procedure. Running the government is more important to us than the running of the automobile business. We know that a country can go into bankruptcy. When there is a probable deficit of \$5 billion between tax revenues and government expense, even though the prospective income is eight times larger than in 1939, this is not only dangerous, it can be disastrous. Something must be done, through less spending and demanding of higher taxes by the

Week's Best Recipe

Dressed up Shreds: 2 1-2 c bite size shredded wheat biscuits, 2 1-2 T cream, 1-2 t almond extract, 3 T melted butter, 1 1-4 c powdered sugar, 3-4 c shredded coconut. Roll cereal into crumbs. Add cream and almond extract to melted butter. Stir in powdered sugar, about 1-4 cup at one time. Stir until smooth. Mix in coconut and 3-4 cup of cereal crumbs. Shape into one-inch balls. As each ball is shaped, roll in the remaining crumbs. Yields 2 doz.

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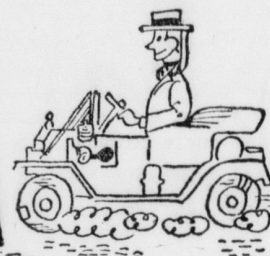
