SQUARE EGGS
A man hesitates to define an acceptable level of civilization, but he is sure one of its material characteristics will be two eggs for breakfast for all who want them. Too many of one's peers take hen fruit for granted. We know the statistics about the baseball clubs but how many know that the average egg production is about 154, an increase of 20 since 1940. In 1918 the average was 86. It requires 80 and 100 pounds of feed for a Leghorn per year and up to 130 for the heavier breeds. There is a weight loss of approximately 28 percent in dressing a fowl completely, about 21 with head and feet left on. And an egg is 65 percent water.

We do not know just how to react to this latest proposal in biological progress. Some-one has proposed that a breed of hens be developed to lay square eggs. There are undoubtedly advantageous factors concerning square eggs. One of the pressing economic problems of our times is how to reduce the cost of distribution. Manufacturers and the wholesalers are acutely concerned with it. It is admittedly easier to pack and handle materials that have square corners and also smooth sides.

There are approximately 5,800,000 farms in our nation and some four million produce considerable amounts to sell, including eggs. If we could get a breed of hens that would produce square eggs of uniform size, it would simplify many problems. It would reduce breakage, facilitate economical packing and save space in all refrigerators. Thoughtful and progressive citizens will agree that any proposition which will reduce the cost of living and simultaneously increase all the farmers' profits should be explored to the ultimate. Probably what we need is a committee. Perhaps the problem has sufficient implications to organize a Congressional Bureau. Certainly a bureau or committee for this purpose would be as beneficial as some new operation. As the subject becomes one of importance in agricultural circles and in general store forums, we hope the proponents will canvas the situation objectively.

41 Per Cent of Land In U. S. in Herbage
Grass Top Resource, Cattlemen Assent
Grass is one of the greatest resources of this nation. In the United States there are approximately 779 million acres of land which will grow nothing but hay, grass and other herbage unfit for human consumption. This great acreage represents 41 per cent of the total land of the nation. About 9 per cent of the lands in the United States are plowable but are used also to produce pasture, hay or forage crops. It can be concluded, therefore, that about 50 per cent of the United States would not be used if it were not for meat animals.



This little fellow, obviously so well-started in life, is symbolic of what good pasturage can mean to cattle and just how much cattle depend on grass. In the United States there are approximately 779 million acres of land which cannot grow anything but hay, grass and other herbage.

Of the total feeds consumed by beef cattle 78.7 per cent is grass, hay and dry roughage. A minimum of grain is needed to bring feeder steers from 700 pounds to 1,000 pounds when the principal part of the ration is made up of hay, ensilage or other roughage. The process of producing beef cattle normally involves the following steps:

1. The purebred operator who produces the sires and females which are the foundation of beef animal production. This branch of the cattle industry is one that requires heavy investment and efficiency in management.
2. The commercial breeder who produces the calves which are the offspring of commercial herds of female and purebred sires.
3. The pasture cattleman who grows the animal from the weaning or yearling stage to two years old, taking his profit from the poundage gained on grass and hay.
4. The feeder who "finishes" the animal from grass stage to slaughter condition, disposing of a large percentage of roughage.

HOW TO KEEP THE COWS PRODUCING, FIX THEIR FEET

Cows are like people in more ways than one. When their feet hurt, their production lags, says a report issued this week by the Am. Foundation for Animal Health.

One of the worst problems for cattle owners, in this respect, is an infection known as "foul foot", says the Foundation. It can be caused by:

Animals stepping on each other's feet during shipment, setting up irritation which develops into infection.

Brusing between the toes when cows step on rocks buried under soft mud.

Animals standing in poorly-drained, uncleaned barn lots.

Wire cuts, or foreign bodies that lodge in the hoof.

Irritation and puncture wounds when cattle are pastured on recently mowed, coarse forage crops. Screw worm damage.

Farmers can help prevent the loss of production which results from such foot troubles by helping to remove some of these same causes, the Foundation points out.

Intravenous injections of certain medicines now help to correct the foul foot infection in most cases, according to research by a group of southern veterinarians which is quoted this week by the Foundation. However, removal of conditions which cause the trouble is the best solution of the problem, authorities said.
