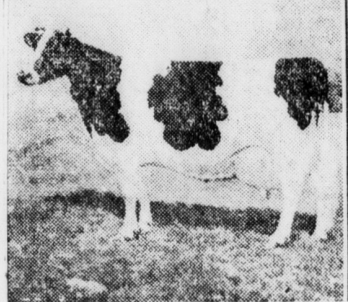

Hershey Park, Hershey, August 27, large numbers of out-of-staters are writing to the local committee for copies of the Pa. Dutch program printed especially for the occasion.

These programs will be printed well in advance of the event to answer the inquiries, the Hershey committee reports to the State Department of Commerce vacation and recreation bureau. The program's cover will depict the Pa. Dutch art.

Fun, culture and philosophy of the early Pa. Dutch—who migrated to Pa. during pre-Colonial days from Germany, Holland, Moravia, Bohemia, Silesia, Alsace and Lorraine and Switzerland in search of religious freedom — will be explained in the program.

Most of the "Pa. Dutch" came from the Rhineland and began to arrive shortly after 1727, attracted not only by political and religious liberty but by the fertility of the lands. Their love for the land is deeply rooted and generally they have been Pennsylvania's finest farmers. About 1776 they numbered 100,000 in this state.

Perhaps the most interesting events of the day will be old-time quilting parties, apple butter boiling in great iron kettles over wood fires, snitzi parties and also horse shoe pitching.

Miles Hurst, Secretary of Agriculture for Pennsylvania, will speak about the farmers of the Pa. Dutch country and Congressman John C. Kunkie, of the 18th Pa. District, will speak on the history of these people. Brief addresses will also be made by outstanding Dutch leaders.

During the day there will be an exhibit of Pa. Dutch Arts and Crafts, a song fest, sports event and music by typical Pa. Dutch bands. In the evening oldtime fiddlers will provide music for folk and square dancing.

Dist. Gov. Swaim At Rotary Meeting

Although Tuesday was the regular meeting of the Rotary Club, there was a special significance attached to the meeting in that the club was host to the District Governor Wm. Swaim, of Mount Holly Springs.

The meeting was in charge of President Walter Sloan. One of the projects that President Swaim would like to accomplish during the year is to have the club to raise the quota of money for the Rotary Foundation, which would make it one of the hundred per-centers in this district.

President Swaim introduced Governor Swaim and the theme of his talk was "Roll Rotary". In his talk Governor Swaim had used the ant as an illustration, saying how wonderful it would be if each one would work with the zeal and cooperation that the ants do. For instance the ants work all the time, looking out for the welfare of the organization of the ant colony and at the same time is serving humanity.

Each ant has a certain duty to perform and they do it. He went on to say that although there are queens in the ant colony, there are no bosses and they live in peace, harmony and good will with service to each other.

Rotarians, said Gov. Swaim must have the spirit of service, the desire to work together, not only with Rotarians of this our country but with other nations, for Rotary is Christianity in action. He went on to say that the ability to work together was seen at the Rotary International Convention which was recently held at New York. Registered at this convention were 1773 different nationalities, all of them outside the United States.

Governor Swaim stated that his roommate at New York was a man from India, a man who had differed in religion, language and ideals, yet they were alike in the respect that they were Rotarians. Rotary International is now stressing the importance of International Service for this year, in hopes that more clubs will become acquainted with those of other nationalities and in so doing will learn to know others a lot better.

When we learn to know others there is understanding and where there is understanding there is good will and where there is good will there is peace.

This was not the first visit of the District Governor to our town. In July the District Assembly was held here and twenty-eight of the thirty-one of the clubs represented. At the noon luncheon of the Assembly there were one hundred two and Gov. Swaim presided.

Gov. Swaim will be in Mount Joy on Thursday evening when he will conduct a club assembly at Hostetters beginning at 6:30 p. m. This meeting is for all the officers and committee chairman of the club.

If fall litters are to be strong and well developed, the brood sows must be fed well during the last two months before farrowing, states L. C. Madison, extension livestock specialist of the Pa. State College. He suggests some grain and animal protein to permit a half to three-quarters lb gain a day. Ample shade and fresh water also are "musts" for all swine during hot weather.

MORE 4-H DAIRY CALVES

Entries in the five district 4-H dairy calf shows to be held at as many different points in the State late this month and in September may reach 400 and set an all-time high record. Because of the uniformly high quality of these animals competition for the ribbon prizes is expected to be particularly close.

MECHANICAL WEED KILLER

While chemical weed controls are coming into more common use, the rotary hoe, spike harrow, or weeder, are still in general use in cornfields. Extension agronomists of the Pa. State College say harrowing knocks weeds out of the row while they are small and keeps the soil surface permeable to moisture and air.

PROVIDE POULTRY RANGE

Poultry extension specialists of the Pa. State College say that an acre of good range will carry 500 to 600 pullets up to 22 weeks of age. From 100 to 200 turkey poulters can be carried on a like area until they attain considerable size.
