The Lancaster County Gas Co. announced it is considering plans to use natural gas instead of the manufactured gas as at present.

The action would involve tapping some, or all, of three natural gas lines that presently pass on through the county - including the "Big Inch" and the "Little Inch".

Introduction of natural gas would augment, but not replace, the present manufactured gas, the company said. It serves 25,000 customers in Lancaster county.

The company is preparing an application to the Federal Power Commission.

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COUNTY PAYS \$104,500 FOR ROAD - LAND DAMAGES

The State Highways Department has received \$104,500 from Lancaster County to help meet land damages incurred in rebuilding the New Holland and Harrisburg Pikes. A total of \$47,500 has been paid toward the New Holland Pike damages and \$57,000 for the Harrisburg Pike.

The State must make up the rest of an estimated total \$750,000 damages in the Harrisburg Pike job and \$157,000 for the New Holland Pike project.

About 20 land damage claims still are not settled in the reconstruction of the New Holland Pike last year. An undetermined, but much larger number, still are not settled in the Harrisburg Pike project.
