Commission for permission to tap the lines. Other agencies also must be asked.

Andrew S. Morgan, gas company president said in a statement: Engineering studies to determine the possible advantages to the Lancaster County Gas Company's 25,000 customers by the introduction of natural gas in this area are nearing completion.

Several natural gas supply lines cross Lancaster County, are namely the Texas Eastern Transmission Corporation's 20 and 24 inch lines and the Manufacturers' Light and Heat Co. lines. These are the most probable of the sources of natural gas for the Lancaster Gas Co.

How to proceed and cost of supply, possible methods of utilization, costs and routes of connecting mains are included in the present studies.

Applications to be made to the Federal Power Commission for permission to obtain gas from these sources are also being prepared.

The gas would be piped to domestic, commercial and industrial users in Lancaster, Litzitz, Manheim and Mt. Joy, Morgan asserted.

Asked what the gas company considers to be the advantages of bringing in natural gas, Morgan said that is one of the things to be determined by the survey.

Natural gas, he said, will not necessarily reduce the gas rates but it will tend to stabilize our production.

Morgan said he doesn't know when the application to the Federal Power Commission will be made but it may be in the very near future. Other applications also must be made and approved.

Neither would he estimate how soon natural gas could be supplied here if the company decides to go ahead with the project.

The project of tapping the lines, he said would involve the construction of metering stations and auxiliary lines to take the gas to the consumers.

Both the Big Inch and the Little Inch pass through Lancaster County about a mile and a half north of Lancaster. The Big Inch was put in during the war and the other line shortly afterwards.

They pass in an east-west direction across the county, and cross the Susquehanna River near Marietta and culminating at Bayway, N. J., with a branch line to Philadelphia. They pipe natural gas underground from Texas.

The Manufacturers' Light and Heat Co. line crosses through the borough of Litzitz and close to Mt. Joy and Manheim. That line, he said, originally carried oil for the Southern Pipelines Co.

The Lancaster County Gas Co. is a subsidiary of the United Gas and Improvement Co. of Philadelphia, and took over the gas manufacturing business of the Pa. Power and Light Co. last March.

That includes the gas manufacturing plant in the southern part of the city and similar plants at Litzitz and Mt. Joy; all manufacturing heating gas from coal; also the gas manufacturing plant at Columbia which makes heating gas from liquid petroleum.

The company's customers include users in Lancaster and the other three boroughs and also users in Manheim.

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
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

The New Equipment
In addition to the 500 gallon pump, the new piece of equipment has a 300 gallon booster tank, two chemical tanks each capable of holding two and one-half gallons of chemicals, 200 feet of booster hose, twin spotlights, twenty-four feet of ladder, 14 feet of roof ladder, two sections of a five inch suction hose and enough space for 2,000 feet of two and one half inch hose.

Plaque On Door
A memorial plaque on the right hand door of the new fire truck reads: "Kaufman T. Keller, president of Chrysler Corp., donated this fire truck, completely equipped, to Friendship Fire Co. No. 1, 1949. Mount Joy's Friendship Fire Co. now has four fire trucks. It also has on order for delivery in the very near future, a fine new modern pumper for which our Borough Council authorized a loan of \$15,000 in payment. The company is considering the disposition of two of these outmoded pieces of equipment.

and said they wished to dispose of as many potatoes locally as is possible, to avoid having to ship them out of the country.
Cost is one cent for a hundred pounds, in bulk; or 15 cents a hundred weight if desired in bags. To obtain the potatoes, all farmers were told to send a check to the Lancaster County Agricultural Conservation Assoc. to pay for the quantity desired. The office will notify the feeder where to pick up the potatoes, at a place as near to his own farm as can be located.
