The building had been damaged during the war, and the owner could not make any repairs because he had no money. When George's parents learned that their son was coming home, they did their best to fix up the place as good as possible, under the circumstances, and one of the things was to fix the roof. This they had done for the sum of four packs of American cigarettes. Another instance was that George desired to send a telegram from Frankfurt to his home in another city. He asked how long it would take and the reply was about four hours. George said he produced a package of American cigarettes, and the man thought it could be done in less time. He later found out that it took but thirty minutes, with the aid of one pack of cigarettes.

George went on to say that the building over there is very slow, and very few homes or business places are being rebuilt. About the only places that are receiving attention and being rebuilt are the churches. This he said is done with the outside aid from other countries by various church groups.

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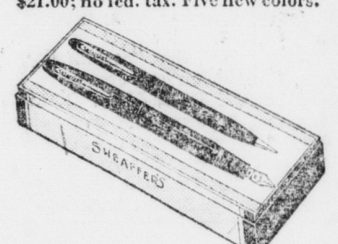
