Benj. W. Stauffer Dies As Result Of Auto Mishap

Benjamin W. Stauffer, forty-five, a farmer, Manheim R4, died in the General Hospital Thursday night as the result of injuries suffered in an automobile accident.

Death was caused by a fractured skull and internal injuries, according to Dr. Charles P. Stahr, deputy coroner.

A complete account of the accident appeared in last week's Bulletin.

Born near Manheim, Stauffer had lived all his life on farms near that section. He was a member of the Erlisman Mennonite Church.

Surviving are his father, Benjamin R. Stauffer, Manheim; his wife, Mrs. Esther Stauffer; four sons and a daughter, Benjamin Jr., H. Glenn Elam K., and Mildred K. all at home.

Surviving also are three brothers, Henry H., Salunga; Walter W. of Lancaster and Elam W., Mennonite Missionary to Africa.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p. m. on Thursday at the Erlisman Mennonite Church, Manheim.

KENNETH GINDER'S AUTO RAN OFF NEW HIGHWAY - The first accident on the relocated portion of the Harrisburg Pike occurred at 4 a. m. Sunday the State Police reported, when a driver apparently fell asleep at the wheel.

State Policeman T. Nagel said J. Kenneth Ginder, twenty, Landisville, was driving south on the Route 230 and failed to negotiate a curve at the intersection of Route 72, the Manheim Pike, running into a field and overturning. He escaped injury, but damage to his vehicle was estimated at \$300.

Ginder told police he dozed at the wheel.

5 Candidates For School Director At Tues. Primary

The Republicans here have contests for nominations for tax collector, school directors and justice of the peace.

Opponents for tax collector are George H. Brown, III and Esther Hockenberry; school directors two to be nominated, Joseph T. M. Breneman, Charles L. Fish, B. Titus Rutt, David Schlosser and Paul Stoner; justice of the peace, Robert K. Brown and James E. Hockenberry.

West Hempfield - Republican voters in West Hempfield Twp. will choose between H. M. Ginder and Ohmer F. Gingrich for nomination for supervisor.

East Donegal - In East Donegal Twp. there is a three-way contest for the nomination for justice of the peace. The candidates are Harry J. Farmer, Clayton Miller and Donald Dean Miller.

Republican voters in that township also will settle a contest for supervisor between Howard S. Barnhart and Norman M. Heisey, and for tax collector with George F. Ester and Marvin R. Fultz the candidates.

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School Board's Reasons For The New Addition

The first issue of the News of Our Schools, issued by East Donegal's School Board says: We shall attempt to show you the reason for the board's decision to ask the voters of this township to approve a \$100,000 loan to build an addition to the present high school building.

The purpose of the addition is to relieve the crowded condition of our high school and our grade schools at the same time.

In the proposed new addition, provision will be made for a large cafeteria and a kitchen, a large combined shop to house both the general shop and the agricultural shop as well as a regular size class (Turn to page 2)
