At General Hospital, an all-time monthly record of 254 births was set including two sets of twins and one set of triplets, an average of eight babies a day. The previous record was set in Sept. 1947, when 240 babies were born.

St. Joseph's Hospital reported August its biggest baby month of

1949. Ninety-one babies, 52 boys and 39 girls were born during the month. It was not an all-time record. Osteopathic Hospital reported 32 births during August, no record.
