Week's Best Recipe

Green Bean Bisque: 3T butter,
1-4 c diced green pepper, 3T flour,
1-2 t celery salt, 1-8 t pepper,
4 c milk, 1-2 c vegetable liquor,
1-2 c French style, cooked
green beans, 1-2 t Worcester-
sauce, 3 hard, cooked eggs, and
grated paprika. Melt the butter,
add onion and pepper, cook over
low heat and stir until tender.
Add flour and seasonings and
blend. Gradually add the milk
and vegetable liquor and cook
over hot water until thickened,
stirring constantly. Add the
beans, stirring constantly add
beans, condiment sauce and the
grated egg, reserving little of the
egg for topping.

Separates will be popular again

ets, groups of small ones or pairs

ing color is camel, using com-
binations of materials as suede

Food Tips

Add slices of cooked frankfur-
ters for additional flavor in po-
tato salad. . . Make a sandwich
spread of leftover meat, adding a
pickle relish and mayonnaise. . . If
dressing is added to cole slaw
about an hour before serving and
salad kept cool in refrigerator,
the flavor is improved. . . To hard
boil eggs, put them in cold wa-
ter, bring to a boil and cook for
about 12 minutes. Plunge into
cold water to cool them immedi-
ately. This tenderizes eggs and
prevents dark rings on them.


