This plant does not spread across fields, but will stay in a straight row and become very thick. It not only gives protection to game against predators, but is thick enough to keep in livestock.

Governor James H. Duff designated the period of October 16 thru the 22nd as "hunt safely week." "Hunting is just as safe as the hunter makes it, but it will remain unsafe as long as man allows his over enthusiasm or itchy trigger finger to account for—not a piece of game—but a human life."
